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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Two buildings are located on this property. The Baer House at 1117 Grove St constructed ca. 1870 is an Eastlake style 2½-story brick house constructed on an L-plan. The front elevation contains a two-story, 3-bay gallery with incised and chamfered posts and curved brackets, and a two-story bay window in the fourth bay. The cornice is modillioned and windows display segmental arches with raised brick drip molds. The gables are enriched with elaborate wood decoration including fish-scale shingles and carved vergeboards. The double-leaf doors contain etched glass and are recessed in a segmental arched opening which is embellished with a classical surround complete with pilasters and modillioned and bracketed cornice. A smaller doorway also set in a segmental arched opening provides access to the second floor gallery. A two-tiered gallery also appends the L as does an unusual two-story clapboard outhouse. The interior includes Eastlake style door surrounds with incised decoration and wainscoting and floors which utilize contrasting light and dark woods.

The Isaacs House at 1121 Grove St. is an Italianate style two-story 3x4-bay brick house with a two-story rear wing constructed ca. 1870. The roof is hipped and the cornice enriched with paired brackets. A side-hall entrance with sidelights and transom is recessed in a segmental arched opening and is sheltered by a shed-roofed entrance porch which is also decorated with paired brackets. Windows contain 6-over-6 sash windows set in segmental arched openings with raised brick drip molds and corbel tables. The two-tiered side galleries have been enclosed.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Of primary importance to the cultural history of Vicksburg, these two houses on Grove Street were the homes during the 1870s through the early 1900s of Jewish merchants whose stores were located on Washington Street and whose synagogue was two blocks away on Cherry Street. Architecturally significant as well, these houses furnished valuable examples of Eastlake and Italianate styles.

The first wave of Jewish immigration to Vicksburg began in the mid-1820s. These early settlers mostly from southern Germany lived in the area near the waterfront and were engaged in mercantile pursuits. Another wave of Jewish families arrived between 1845-1865. According to an 1866 city directory there were about ninety Jewish families in Vicksburg and they owned approximately thirty-five stores. (Gertrude Philippborn, <u>The History of the Jewish Community of Vicksburg</u>, Vicksburg, 1969, p. 12.) As their prosperity and numbers increased the Jewish community in 1868 built a permanent temple, Anche Chesed, on Cherry Street and some families began to move up the hill from the waterfront nearer to the new synagogue.

Leon Baer first arrived in Vicksburg in 1853. He then peddled goods through the country and in Mexico returning to Vicksburg in 1865 to establish a dry goods store. Soon after he sent for his two brothers Isaac and Abe and the firm became known as Baer & Brothers. Outliving his brothers, Leon Baer died in 1924. The business which by then had grown into a "massive enterprise" (Mercantile and Industrial Review, Issued in Vicksburg by the Traffic Department of the Queen and Cresent Route, Alabama and Vicksburg Railway Co., Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific Railway Co., 1907) was continued by heirs of the Baer estate. Reflecting the prosperity that Leon Baer had accumulated by the 1870s, the Baer House is of substantial size and well articulated in the Eastlake style employing elaborate wood detailing in the gables and on the porch. The interior is even more elaborate employing diagonally laid striped flooring in contrasting woods, and Eastlake style door surrounds with incised decoration. These details as well as wainscoting, mantels, doors and an elaborate cabinets in the upstairs halls have been well preserved.

Louis Isaacs arrived in Vicksburg prior to the Civil War. He became a partner with A. Ruhman in the merchant tailoring business of Ruhman and Co. and purchased the house on Grove Street in 1878. By 1895 the house belonged to Charles and Max Isaacs probably sons of Louis Isaacs. They ran Charles Isaacs and Brother, a men's furnishing business. Although plain in comparison to the Baer House, the Isaac House is a good example of a modest Italianate style home with characteristic features of paired brackets and segmentally arched window and door openings.
