PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION The Fredericks House is a one-and-a-half story wood frame structure			
45 feet wide and 70 feet deep. The plan is roughly rectangular but has several niches			
and extensions. Roof shapes are primarily gabled; ridges do not intersect. Shingles			
cover the roof and gables; cut stone is used as the foundation and in the porch; other major exterior surfaces appear to be stuccoes. Decorative mullions occur in the second			
story windows and occasionally in windows on the first floor. Gable beams are decorated.			
STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE R.N. Fredericks was a banker and capitalist. He is primarily			
known as having served as president of the Prescott National Bank, although his personal			
investments in mining, businesses, and railroads were important in the development of the			
region. Fredericks' home, which he built in 1902 and 1903, is characteristic of the sty-			
listic ambiguity of the time. Due to the conservative influence of the Neo-Classical and			
the simplifying effect of the Shingle Style, the house is rendered in large well articu- lated forms. Roof shapes and banded windows contribute to the horizontal character of the			
building. Plastered surfaces combine with stone masonry, shingled gables, and decorative			
barge boards. The nineteenth century models can be detected; but the effect is thoroughly
