Description:		Level of Significance:
The Fred Wallauer Farmhouse is located in Section 5 of Hay Creek Township, on the west side of Minnesota Highway 58.		Local <input checked="" type="checkbox"/>
The main section of the Fred Wallauer Farmhouse, built in 1882, is a two-story brick structure, measuring 35 by 27 feet. Its front facade is five bays wide, with segmental-arched, stone-keystoned, four-over-four windows, and a large segmental-arched, transomed doorway. The Farmhouse is a fine example of Italianate architecture, with a low-hipped roof with a large central gable forming a pediment over the east (front) facade, an oculus in the gable end, a basically cubiform shape, an ornately bracketed and columned porch running the length of the east facade, and a one-story, bracketed, double bay window projecting from the south side. Significance:		Status:
The Fred Wallauer Farmhouse is significant as an indication of the considerable prosperity attained by many southeast Minnesota farmers in the latter decades of the 19th century.		Survey _____ Date _____
Built in 1882, the Fred Wallauer Farmhouse was the third house built on the site, dwarfing the frame cottage attached to its rear that had replaced the original log cabin. In barely a quarter century after the first settlement, farmers like Fred Wallauer were able to rise from crude pioneer quarters to housing of great comfort and even elegance. Due to the richness of his 371 acres of land, Wallauer was able to weather the shifts from wheat to diversified to dairy farming, and accumulate the capital needed to build such a substantial farmhouse.
