the north and south entrances are rectangular; both have designs carved in relief. The stairways leading to all entrances are ornate; those leading to the east and west entrances are straight while those leading to the north and south entrances are in the shape of an inverted Y.

The windows on the first floor have round arches, and the keystone of each window arch has a carving of an Indian head representing one of the Indian tribes of the region. The basement, second and third floor windows are rectangular, with the exception of the large round arched windows on the second floor above the entrances. These windows are flanked by Ionic pilasters of a carved floral design. Their panes, as well as those of the basement windows under the north and south entrances are of a Roman design. At the base of the round arched second floor windows is a balustrade; on the east and west sides it is flush with the windows while on the north and south sides it forms the edge of a balcony in front of the windows. There is also an ornate balustrade in front of the third story windows.

The courthouse has a clock tower extending from the center of the building. This tower was constructed high enough to permit the construction of a fourth story if this was ever desired, but the additional story was never built. The clock tower is ornate, and has clocks on all four sides. Above the clocks is a floor with Roman pillar and arch construction with balustrades connecting the arches; above this floor is one with Corinthian columns surrounded by an ornate balustrade; finally, the tower is topped with an ornate dome./ This tower can be seen from a great distance and so provides a sense of orientation for the residents of the region.

Marble and bronze are used extensively in the building. Extensive use is also made of columns throughout the basement and first two floors. In the center of the building is a rectangular bird cage elevator which was installed in 1917 and is still in operation today.

Through the courthouse are scattered large paintings depicting ranching, mining and other scenes which reflect the history of the region. On the north wall of the main courthouse is painted a silver goddess of justice, and on the south wall there is one of gold. In addition to these paintings, gingerbread wood carving was used to enhance the decor of the main courtroom. Mr. David Smith, brother of the architect, is believed to have carved the floral designs into the wood.

Past alterations include closing off the east and west entrances to provide more room for offices, and some of the larger rooms have been partitioned to make more offices. The entire building is now used for offices and courtrooms.

Some repairs will be needed. However, any alterations in plans for its future use as a museum, exhibition hall, and meeting place will restore the building more closely to its original appearance.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

On April 18, 1899 the County of El Paso entered into a land agreement with the Town of Colorado Springs and the Colorado Springs Co. At that time, the county paid ten dollars to the Colorado Springs Co. for Alamo Square. General William Palmer, founder of Colorado Springs, was the president of the Colorado Springs Co. and was responsible for the concept and for setting aside Alamo Square as a park site and for use as a site for a county courthouse.

In 1901, the El Paso County Commissioners initiated construction of the new county courthouse in Alamo Square. It was designed by A. J. Smith and the major portion of the construction was handled by Archie and Agnus Gillis, local builders and stone cutters. The building was dedicated on May 16, 1903 to the people of the Pikes Peak Region. /

The courthouse has witnessed thousands of trials during its sixty-nine years of existence. Some of these cases have had local historical significance.

In addition to the judicial element of the courthouse's history, there have been several historical personages connected with it. Besides General Palmer, Major Henry McAllister and Irving Howbert were associated with the courthouse. Major McAllister fought with General Palmer during the Civil War under the fighting 15th and was his right hand man; he delivered the opening address at the dedication of the building. Mr. Howbert, an important banker in the community and author of <u>Memories of a Lifetime in the Pikes</u> <u>Peak Region</u>, also participated in the dedication ceremonies.

A new county judicial building and jail complex are being constructed across the street from the courthouse. When they are completed, the courthouse will be vacated, and unless it is put to use, which will require fome repairs and restoration, it is in danger of being razed. The Colorado Springs Central Area Plan endorsed by both the City and ENPAC (a private organization comprised of downtown businessmen) includes preservation of the courthouse and its surrounding park as an integral part of the plan. It is to be hoped that the courthouse will be preserved and employed for such uses as a museum, public meeting rooms, exhibition hall, and a public park.
