Built in 1891-2, the Haralson County Courthouse in Buchanan was designed by the Atlanta architectural firm of Bruce and Morgan in the Queen Anne style.

This brick structure with its multi-hipped roofs has two towers that spiral upward above the two story main portion: one is a square belltopped turret with a motif of terracotta and brickwork and small colored window panes that are supported by long vertical windows and a stone foundation. The first story of the main portion, denoted by its row of two-over-two windows and arched front entrance, has a central stair hall with three large county government offices on each side. In two of these rooms are safevaults; one was made by Hall's Safe Lock Company, Cincinnati and Louisville. The second story, recognizable on the exterior by the round arched multicolored stained glass windows, consists primarily of a large courtroom and several jury and judge's rooms that adjoin it on the rear. The courtroom, a spacious, light-filled room with access through the turret stairs or through the main hall staircase, is arranged in a slightly semi-circular plan around a recently installed judge's bench. (The only apparent major alterations are that of the shifting of the staircase and the loss of the weathervane atop the square tower which fell soon after the courthouse was built).

A more complete and original description, particularly of the interior, is found in the June 4, 1891, Buchanan newspaper, The Banner Messenger. "The following is a description of the above new courthouse for Haralson County as given by Bruce and Morgan, architects:

The dimensions on the gound are 64×92 feet, arranged as follows:

The front central entrance into broad vestibule is tiled with Georgia marble from which we enter a fourteen foot corridor extending through the building. On each side of the corridor are the several offices of the county, large and well lighted. The largest room is given to the Ordinary for business and court purposes. Joining the Ordinary and Clerk's offices are the fire proof record rooms, amply large, well lighted and fitted with iron shutters, vault doors, iron floors and ceilings. From the first entrance Vestibule are wide, easy stairs built of oak leading to second floor entering a large lobby from which we enter the Superior Court room: steps 44 x 60 inches in the clear, only 22 feet high. Large space is given to the bar and jury boxes and the balance in seating, on raised floor, from 250 to 300 persons comfortably. The Grand jury room, Solicitor's, jury and Judge's rooms are conveniently located with the bar, fitted with all modern conveniences. The rear stairs are located so as to reach the bar and jury rooms without coming in contact with those in the seats and lobby. Judge's stand is large and conveniently arranged for the dispatch of court business. Court and jury rooms all wains cotted. Wood ceilings to the first floor rooms.

The exterior, as shown by the above picture makes a very

neat and attractive building with large corner tower about 110 feet high and on other corner a small round turrett, and the several stairway landings are neatly finished up in good taste and proportions. The construction is convenient and substantial in every department."

Presently, the courthouse sits sublimely alone on the town square and faces small clustered blocks of one story simple structures, a few of which are contemporary with the courthouse and some that have gone the way of the neon-lit gas station.

8. Significance

used. Its architects, especially noted for their public buildings, Alexander C. Bruce and Thomas H. Morgan, either singly or as partners designed a number of courthouses including the Newton County Courthouse in Covington, the Fulton County Courthouse in association with A. Ten Eych Brown and the Hancock County Courthouse (by Parkins and Bruce in 1881).

Presently the courthouse is leased by the Haralson County Historical Society in an attempt to preserve the building which was due for demolition after the courthouse offices were moved to the new building in the spring of 1973. Its potential as a meeting place for crafts fairs and civic meetings has already been fully exhibited especially by the Society Crafts Fair held there in the fall of 1973.

The Haralson County Courthouse is the most outstanding building in Haralson County and rates architecturally among the best of Victorian courthouses in the state. Its virtually original state as well as its symbolic position in Haralson County makes it especially noteworthy. No longer used for courthouse purposes, the building is presently leased by the Haralson County Historical Society and used as a meeting place.

This present Queen Anne style Haralson County Courthouse was the second courthouse for Haralson County which was formed out of Carroll and Polk Counties in 1856. This first courthouse, on the same site as the present one, was built of wood and by the late 1880's its railing, blinds, and windows "nocked out during the fire" (mid January 1889) needed replacing. It was thus decided a large courthouse, that would be a safe place to store records, was necessary. By July 1890, the recommendation was placed before the grand jury that a new courthouse be built. The ordinary was to use his judgement in choosing the architect and contractor and the cost was not to exceed \$20,000. The Atlanta firm of Bruce and Morgan was chosen as the architects, and Mr. C. W. Goldin of Cleburne County, Alabama, was given a contract for \$16,989.50 to build the courthouse. The building committee for this project included S. L. Hilton, W. A. Loveless, L. Thomas and A. L. Morgan. By January 7, 1891, work on the courthouse was going on: weatherbeaten front of the old wooden building is being relegated to the rear and already the clinking of the stone cutter's chisel is heard while he is placing down the foundation for the handsome two story brick." (June 4, 1891, Banner-Messenger) By mid July the cornerstone of the new courthouse was laid and during this time court was carried on in the Baptist Church.

As a symbol of Haralson County, the courthouse is especially significant. At a time when numerous counties were publishing leaflets and booklets trying to promote interest in their area as being a good place to live, Haralson used the courthouse to reflect its progress. In the June 4, 1891 issue of the Banner Messenger, the courthouse article is prefaced with praises of the county's fertile lands, its record of "good health, good water, salubrious climate," and its upstanding people; it also stresses that "nothing gives a county more dignity and a better name than a clean, substantial administration of her public affairs." The courthouse was thus a summary and, as a result, an advertisement of the county's attributes.

Architecturally, the courthouse is a good example of the Queen Anne style with its irregularities of heights, masses and variety of materials (continued)
