Summary

The Twin Bridges Historic District is located off of Washington County Road 11 and consists of two single-span, closed-spandrel concrete deck arch bridges that were designed and constructed by the Luten Bridge Company in 1922. Both bridges remain in excellent condition.

Elaboration

The Twin Bridges Historic District is located just to the east of Washington County Road 11 and less than a half-mile north of AR Highway 45. Both bridges are single-span, closed-spandrel concrete deck arch bridges designed and constructed by the Luten Bridge Company in 1922.

Although both bridges were originally located on County Road 11, that road was straightened in 1955, and a modern concrete bridge was constructed to the west of the Twin Bridges. The smaller and southernmost of the two bridges, Bridge # 2, is now located on Washington County Road 3412, which extends to the east from County Road 11, and spans a small creek draining perpendicular into the Baron Fork creek. This bridge is approximately 23' in length, 14' in width, and has a height of 12' over water.

Bridge # 1 spans the Baron Fork creek and is situated north-south on a short road which connects County Road 3412 and County Road 11, just to the east of the 1955 bridge. It is approximately 80' in length, 14' in width, and has a height of 20' over water. Although both bridges feature concrete parapets, the Bridge # 1 parapet is substantially higher. In both cases, the deck of the bridge is covered with dirt and gravel.

Summary

The Twin Bridges Historic District, located on Washington County Road 11, is being nominated as an amendment to the *Historic Bridges of Arkansas* multiple property nomination as the best known extant examples of closed-spandrel type bridges designed and constructed by the Luten Bridge Company in Washington County.

Elaboration

According to Washington County records, on October 27, 1921 thirteen different petitions were presented and read to the county court requesting the construction of new bridges in the county. The county judge, Ernest Dowell, appointed two commissioners, H. C. Evins and Bruce Holcomb, to determine the bridge sites most needed and to effect their construction when funds were available. Also approved at that session of the county court was a motion that all approaches leading to the bridges should ". . . be built by the citizens and residents benefitted, without expense to this County, and same to be satisfactory to Engineer and County Judge."

Earnest Dowell served as Washington County Judge from 1921 to 1926, and it was under his leadership that approximately 13 bridges were built in the county by the Luten Bridge Company during this time. Bruce Holcomb (1873-1924) was a former Washington County Clerk and a respected businessman. H. C. Evins (1872-1963) was raised in the Morrow area, though he served as Justice of the Peace from Fayetteville at the time of the bridge construction. In addition to these three men, the name of H. O. Morrow is found on an original bronze plaque attached to Bridge # 1. Morrow, a local farmer and school board member, served as Justice of the Peace for the Morrow area and was instrumental in obtaining the Twin Bridges for the area residents.

The Twin Bridges were constructed by the Luten Bridge Company of Knoxville, Tennessee, who are also believed to have built the remainder of the 13 or so bridges that were contracted for during Dowell's administration. A history of the Luten Bridge Company is included in the "Arkansas Highway and Transportation Era" context of the *Historic Bridges of Arkansas* multiple property nomination. In Northwest Arkansas, the Luten Bridge Company is also known for the double-span 1922 Illinois River Bridge (NR 1/28/88) in Benton County.

In 1955, County Road 11 was expanded to two lanes and paved. Consequently, the road was straightened and a new concrete bridge was constructed to the west of the Twin Bridges. Although the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department planned on removing the two older bridges, County Judge William Bush requested that the bridges be retained for use by the

local residents.

As the Twin Bridges Historic District in the Morrow vicinity contains the two best known examples of the single-span, closed-spandrel concrete deck arch bridge type to survive in Washington County (the fate of the other eleven is unknown), they are being nominated under Criterion C with local significance as an amendment to the *Historic Bridges of Arkansas* multiple property nomination.




