DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The West Market Square Historic District is a compact and cohesive grouping of 6 mid-19th century buildings and one building of the early 20th century, all commercial in nature, which are in an excellent state of preservation. All are survivors of the disastrous fire of 1911 which gutted most of the commercial area of downtown Bangor. In 1968 much of what was left was destroyed by urban renewal leaving this small cluster as the best of the remaining 19th century downtown. There are no intrusions present. Included in the nomination is a triangular pedestrian mall formed from part of the original open market area.

- 1. Merrill Trust Company Building, 2 Hammond Street, 1906-07, Neo-Classical Revival, 3 stories, brick with limestone columns, sill course and entablature, granite trim. Frank E. Newman (Newman and Harris), New York City, Architect.
- Wheelwright-Clark Block, 2-8 Broad Street, 1859, (NR 7/18/74), Second Empire, 5 stories (including Mansard), brick with wood and cast iron trim. Col. Benjamin S. Deane, Architect.
- 3. E. P. Baldwin Building, 10-12 Broad Street, by 1843, Greek Revival, 4 stories (originally 3 stories with pitched roof, 4th story and flat with Italianate cornice added in 1880's), brick with granite trim.
- 4. Sophie H. Brown Block, 14 Broad Street, c.1865, Mansard, 4 stories, brick with granite and wood trim. Originally identical in style to building #7, the Mansard dormers were altered c.1910.
- '5. Webster Treat Block, 18 Broad Street, c.1865. Mansard, 4 stories, brick with granite and wood trim. Also originally identical in style with building #7, the second floor was altered in the 1890's.
- '6. Phenix (sic) Block, 20-24 Broad Street, 1869-70, High Victorian, 4 stories, brick with wood cornice and segmental pediment.
- •7. G. W. Pickering Block, 32-36 Broad Street, c.1865, Mansard, 4 stories, brick with granite and wood trim.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

West Market Square, originally known as Market Square, was the first open area market place in Bangor. As far back as 1834, at the incorporation of the City, the corner of Main and Broad Streets was listed in the <u>City Directory</u> as Market Square - to distinguish it from its new counterpart at the corner of Central, Harlow and Park Streets - which was known as East Market Square.

West Market Square remained the central focus of all business activities through most of the 19th and 20th centuries. The occupants of its buildings read like a Who's Who of Bangor's leading and most prosperous citizens. It was the location of doctors, attorneys, dentists, druggists, bookkeepers, booksellers, grocers, confectioners, jewelers and merchants of all kinds. At one point during the latter part of the 1800's, West Market Square was the location of at least four individual banks.

The single block selected for nomination is the only grouping of buildings remaining in tact which convey the ambience and scale of West Market Square as it existed in the 19th and early 20th centuries.



Beginning at the intersection of west shore of the Kenduskeag Stream with the south side of State Street, the district boundary runs west along the south side of Main Street, southeasterly along the east side of Broad Street and easterly along an unnamed alley to the west shore of Kenduskeag Stream which it follows north to the point of beginning. This boundary encloses one contignous city block.
