

Name of Property	

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The Willow Grove Farm is located in Minnehaha County. The farm is located in the community of Renner. The farm was homesteaded and established in 1872. This property is a multiple resource district. Located on the farm are the following buildings: main house, privy, barn, and outbuildings. Construction occurred between 1872 and 1935.

Main House, Non-Contributing:

The Main House, constructed between 1872 and 1890, is a gable and wing building with a stone foundation and asphalt shingled roof. The house has been sided with artificial siding and has had windows replaced. The façade (south elevation) has an enclosed shed roof porch at the southwest corner. The gable portion has two one-over-one windows on the first and second floor. To the east is an open shed roof porch with replacement posts. There is a entry door and one-over-one double hung window on the first floor. Above the porch roof is a gable dormer with a one-over-one double hung window.

The east elevation has a three part replacement window on the first floor. The second floor has two one-over-one double hung windows. The gable end has decorative shingles. A hipped roof one story addition was made to the north. This section has a one-over-one double hung window. The north elevation has an enclosed window and an entry door on the hipped roof addition. The gable has two one-over-one windows on the first and second floor. The west elevation has a one-over-one double hung window on the first and second floor. The enclosed porch has a sliding window.

The interior of the house features murals painted on three walls depicting scenes from the Queen Bee Mill in Sioux Falls, Norwegian fjords, waterfalls, ships and pastures all set on a stage with drapes, lanterns and corded tiebacks. The ceiling painting mimics a rug. The artist is unknown but believed to be a local artist, Ole Runing, that lived in the area

Gable-Entry Bank Barn, Contributing:

The barn, constructed in 1892, rests on a stone foundation. The northwest corner of the foundation has been repaired with concrete block. The walls are wood clapboard and the roof has asphalt shingles. The east elevation has an entry door in the center. On either side of the door is a window; to the north is a three-over-one window, to the south is a one-over-one window. The second floor has a square fixed pane window in the southeast corner.

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The north elevation has sliding doors in the center of the first floor. There is a window opening in the gable end. In the center of the gable is a cross gable cupola. Each elevation of the cupola has a double arch opening with louvers. The cupola is clad with wood clapboards.

The west elevation has an entry door, with a transom, on the lower level. To the north of the door is a rectangular window opening with block glass. To the south of the door is a window opening that has been covered with wood paneling. To the south of the window is an another door.

The south elevation has a historic one story hipped roof addition at the southwest corner. It has a stone foundation with a door and window opening. The first floor has two square window openings. The east elevation of the addition has a fixed four pane window. There is a door at the southeast corner of the main barn.

The interior of the barn features an open basement with minimal animal pens. This area houses the cattle. The first floor has a drive-in for machinery. The east end is enclosed for storage. The second floor is used as a hayloft. The building is constructed with mortise, tenon, and pegged joints, no nails were used.

Silo, Contributing:

The silo, constructed circa 1920, is located at the south end of the bank barn. It is concrete with metal bands. It is approximately 20 feet wide and 35 feet high.

Garage, Contributing:

The garage was constructed circa 1910. The gable end building has no foundation, wood clapboard siding and an asphalt shingle roof. The sliding garage doors are located in the gable end. The north and south elevations have two two-over-two double hung windows. The east elevation has no openings.

Granary, Contributing:

The granary, constructed circa 1910, has no foundation, wood clapboard siding and a wood shingle roof. The façade (west elevation) has a door with a transom in the center of the side gable. The south elevation has a small square door on the first floor and a one-over-one double hung window in the gable peak. The east elevation has a shed roof, one story addition. There are no openings on this elevation. The north elevation has a one-over-one window in the gable peak. In the center of the gable ridge is a square opening for grain.

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Privy, Contributing:

Locate behind the house is a WPA constructed privy. This shed roof structure has a door on the east elevation and a square window on the south elevation.

Barn, Non-Contributing:

The metal horse barn was constructed after 1980. It is a gable metal roof, metal sided building.

Windmill, Non-Contributing:

The installation date for the metal windmill is unknown. The base of the structure is extant but the paddles are missing.

Pumphouse, Contributing:

The pumphouse is a simple gable roof building. It has no foundation, wood clapboards and an asphalt shingle roof. There is a door on the east elevation. There is a fixed four pane window on both the north and south elevation. The west elevation has no openings.

Statement of Significance

The Willow Grove Farm is eligible under Criterion C in that it embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type and period.

Historical Background

Minnehaha County was officially organized in 1862 by the first territorial legislature. Townships were slowly established within the county. Mapleton Township, which later became the community of Renner, was established in 1864. This area encompasses 23,024 acres of Minnehaha County. The Big Sioux River flows through the county from north to south. The area is excellent for agricultural practices.

Jonas Olson and his wife Anne Langness were the original homesteaders of this property. The homestead house was constructed in 1872 with the barn to follow in 1892. A more elaborate addition was made to the homestead in 1890. The remaining buildings on the property were constructed as the need arose. In 1934, the property transferred to the youngest son of Jonas and Anne, Edwin and Julie Nessan. The farm remained in the family until 1989.

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The Gable Entry Bank Barn, constructed in 1892 by Jonas Olson Nessan, is a design not commonly found in South Dakota. Identifying features of this style of barn include: a ridgeline that runs perpendicular to the hill slope, an upslope entry through the gable end, two floors with a loft, and an entry on every level and elevation. This barn typifies all of the identifying characteristics of this style barn. This style is more commonly found in New England and Wisconsin.

The privy is a typical federal relief constructed privy. It has the identifying shed roof and square window on the façade. The privy is a representative type found throughout South Dakota. According to the *Federal Relief Construction in South Dakota 1929-1941*, roughly \$62 million was spent on WPA construction projects in South Dakota. Of that, only 2.8% was spent on sanitation. This privy is eligible under Criterion C as well as Criterion A for is association with Depression-era federal relief projects.

The remaining historic resources on the ranch complex are vernacular in form and represent a type of construction common to ranches. They do not, for the most part, have any distinctive decorative elements but these buildings and structures are architecturally significant as highly intact examples of typical South Dakota ranch structures. Not only are they good individual examples of various building types but also are noteworthy because of the high degree of integrity in the ranch complex. The buildings on this property reflect the integrity, workmanship and history or rural ranching life in South Dakota.

The Willow Grove Farm is eligible under Criterion C in that it embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type and period. The Gable Entry Bank Barn represents an uncommon barn style of South Dakota. Other buildings on the property are also significant under Criterion C including the garage, granary and pumphouse.


Verbal Boundary Description


