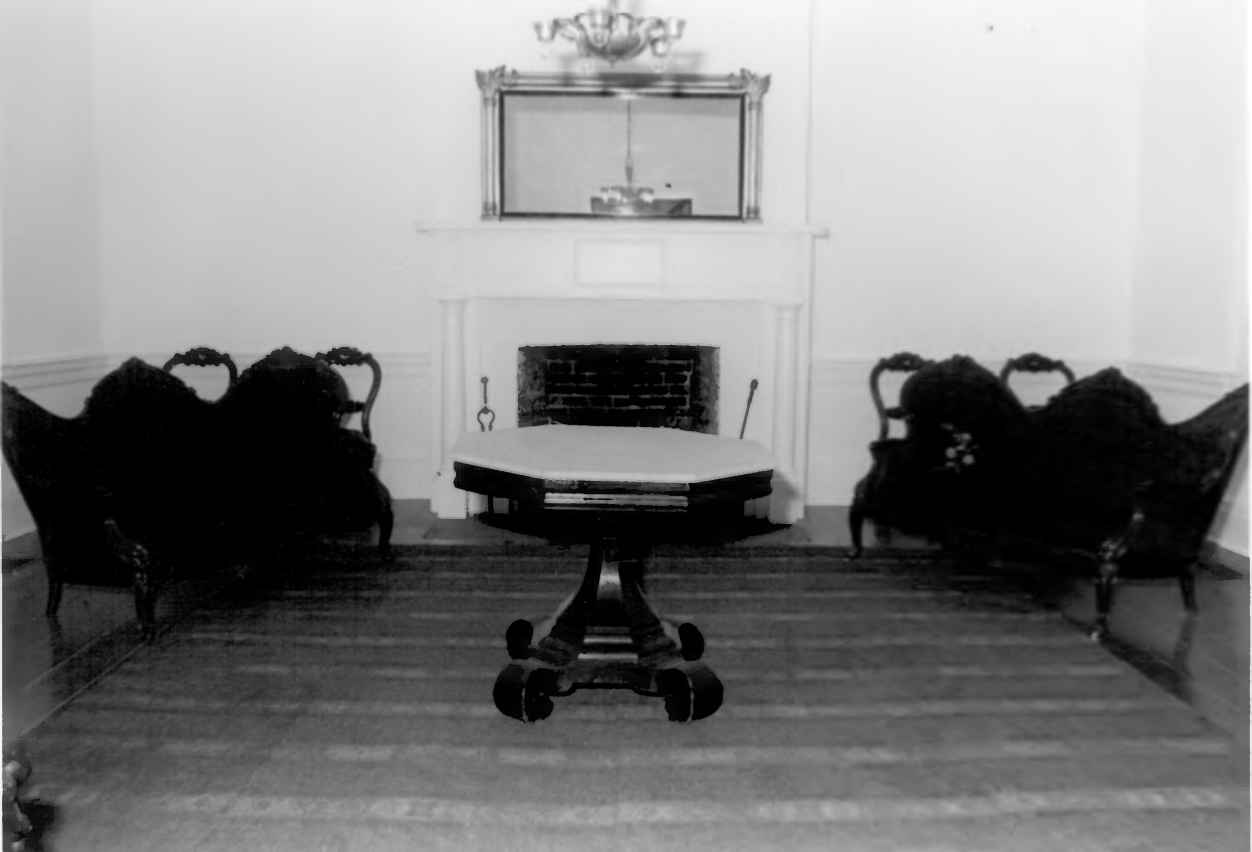

GREENFIELD

On this eminence stood Greenfield, a pioneer stockade fort built in 1784 by Colonel Anthony Bledsoe on his Greenfield Tract of 6,280 acres. A force of Indian warriors, estimated to be 260 strong, attacked the fort on the morning of April 28, 1793, and killed two of its few defenders. The last stages of the short battle were fought near the spring branch to the south. Anticipating arrival of reinforcements for the settlers, the attackers withdrew before noon.

David Chenault of Madison County, Kentucky purchased 595 acres in 1836 from Isaac Bledsoe, son of Anthony Bledsoe. In 1840 carpenter John Fonville built the brick plantation house for Chenault and his consort, Louisa Qulsenberry Chenault, who reared 14 children here.
