DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cushman Tavern, dating from c.1825, is a fine and well-preserved late Federal style building.

The building is of frame construction with $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories, 3 internal brick chimneys, gable roof, clapboard siding, and granite foundation. The facade, which faces east, is 5 bays wide, while the gable-ends are 2 bays wide. The facade contains a central entrance which consists of a panelled door flanked by pilasters and sidelights, likewise flanked by pilasters. A delicate fanlight caps the door. The entrance is covered by an entablatured lintel. Fenestration throughout the building is 2/2, but it would originally have been 9/6 or 6/6.

Extending from the south end of the building is a 2-story ell which is 3 bays long and contains an entrance adjacent to the main building, facing south. An attached gable-roofed shed of one story and a 2-story frame barn extend from the southern end of the ell.

The most distinctive internal feature is hall murals, discussed under the significance of the Cushman Tavern.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built c.1825 by a Mr. Dwinal, this large house was sold within two years to Captain Samuel Cushman who operated it as a tavern for many years. It is now a private residence.

The significance of this building lies in the magnificent murals by Orison Wood executed in the first and second story hallways and the wall of the stairwell between. These murals are outstanding examples of highly stylized primitive painting.

In her book, Rufus Porter, Yankee Pioneer, Jean Lipman writes, "Orison Wood (1811-1842) of Auburn, Maine, was Porter's outstanding follower. He is listed in the Wood genealogy as "a painter by trade" who was also a schoolteacher. His father, Solomon, had gone to Boston as a young man to seek his fortune, and had found employment with an Italian who made, painted and peddled decorative plaster ornaments. Orison evidently learned the plaster painting technique from his father, using it to decorate plaster walls instead of figurines. About 1830 he frescoed at least four houses in West Auburn, Lewiston and Webster Corner, Maine, with landscapes clearly planned after Porter designs. These were executed in Porter's recommended technique, perhaps actually under his supervision. Wood was, however, no mere assistant; his animated murals have, within the Porter formula, a distinctive gracile style of their own. We get a firsthand glimpse of the painter's sales technique from an old issue of the Lewiston Journal (January 22, 1927) where we can read the story -recorded by Captain Cushman's daughter--of how a stranger came to the door of the Cushman Tavern in Webster Corner soon after it was built in 1826, said he was an artist, and could paint the walls with marvelous decorations which would help to advertise the Cushman House far and wide and make its name notable on the lips of the traveling public. Wood's frescoes must have brought travelers to the Cushman Tavern in his day. Perhaps now, after these works have been ignored for over a century, some people will once more come to the former tavern on the old stage road from Portland to Bangor just to see the frescoes. Certainly these landscape designs in which willowy trees fill the space in a bold pattern are outstanding examples of early American art."
