DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The original part of the adobe structure, five to seven feet thick at its base and tapering to three feet at the top, was built during the prosperous years of the San Luis Rey Mission, probably in the early 1800's. Like other mission structures throughout California, it was built with Indian labor, their expertise learned from mission padres. Rough-hewn sycamore logs were placed across the tops of the walls to support the heavy roof tiles. Originally, the house may have had only two rooms. It served as an *estacion* of the mission, possibly as a dormitory for Indian farm workers. An inventory drawn up in 1835 when the mission holdings were secularized, reported "a dwelling house covered with tile, 16 yards long and 13 yards wide with a door", and valued at 300 *pesos* (about \$300). A winery was said to be in evidence in the vicinity as early as Terro.

The present Ranch House is the result of numerous repair and enlargement projects. The house itself is a 23-room edifice, single-story in appearance, but with a partial basement. Its architecture is Mexican adobe with white stucco exterior, red tile roof and a center patio. The old winery has been converted to an attractive chapel where regular religious services are conducted. An old cowboy bunkhouse on the site has been converted to a <u>museum</u>. The buildings occupy a beautifully landscaped grounds area of nearly ten acres. The Ranch House serves as residential quarters for the Commanding General of the Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Santa Margarita Ranch House (site) was established originally by padres of the San Luis Rey Mission, probably as an agricultural center. Its first private owners were Andres Pice and his brother, Pio Pice, who was the last Mexican Governor of Alta California. The Pico Brothers used the house as headquarters while amassing a huge land empire extending from San Luis Rey to San Gabriel. Later, during the Mexican War, Pio used it as a hiding place in his flight to Mexico from the "Americanos." In 1864, Don Juan Forster, brother-in-law of the Picos, paid off their debts and thereby acquired Rancho Santa Margarita. Under Forster's ownership the Ranch House became famous for its lavish and long-lasting parties. It was also well known for its hospitality and as a In 1882 the ranch was refuge even for complete strangers. purchased by Richard O'Neill and James L. Flood of the Comstock Lode. Under these gentlemen and their heirs, the Ranch House served as headquarters for a mammoth cattle ranching operation until 1942, when the property was acquired by the Federal Government for use as a Marine Corps training station. When President Franklin D. Roosevelt visited the Ranch House in September, 1942, he is said to have requested that one of the bedrooms be reserved for his use after his retirement. This room still is known as the President's Room. Since 1947 the house has served as quarters for Camp Pendleton's Commanding Generals. It still is known for its hospitality, having seen many thousands of visitors in its present role.

A booklet entitled "The Ranch House, Santa Margarita y Las Flores, United States Marine Corps Base, Camp Joseph H. Pendleton" is included with the enclosures.
