19. History The Jones house is believed to have been built about 1831 for Edward Jones, son of Col. John Jones, who came to Jefferson County from Loudon County, Virginia. According to oral tradition, Edward Jones was a spy in the Confederate Army and was captured in New Orleans, later escaping to Mexico. Description

The Jones House is a two-story, brick I - house of Federal design, with five bays and fine Flemish bond brickwork on both the front and rear facades. Queen closers at the corners and jack arches provide additional evidence of the quality craftsmanship involved in its construction.

Originally, the house faced south toward Church Road which now exists as a mere alley. The present front, which faces Valley Station Road, was the rear. Slight alterations and additions have been made to adopt the Jones House for use as a day care center. These include a small rear addition and side porch. Original woodwork and mantels remain.

Significance

The Jones house is architecturally significant because it is an excellent example of nineteenth-century construction with Flemish bond brickwork and queen closers on both the front and rear facades - a feature found on only a few houses in Jefferson County. In addition it is one of a small number of surviving early nineteenth-century houses in Southwest Jefferson County.

Boundary Description

The boundary of the nominated site is the perimeter of the house. There are no significant outbuildings.
