Summary

Obviously patterned after 18th century Colonial Georgian architecture, the design of the Cherry House is the most "correct" of Edgemont's period revival residences. The house features a five-part plan that was a common Southern variation on the Georgian style, with the "main house" linked by "hyphens" to flanking "dependencies."

Elaboration

Built in 1930 along with the two other pre-Depression houses on Dooley Road, the Cherry House was a distinct departure from all the other houses built in Edgemont up to that time. It was the first Colonial Revival-style house (though another, the Jeffries House at 415 Skyline Drive was built before development of Edgemont came to a halt), and its design more carefully copied the architecture that inspired it, in this case 18th century colonial Georgian homes. The house is oriented to the south on a two-lot site.

Comprised of a two-story central main house flanked by connected one-story dependencies, the Cherry House is veneered with brick that has been painted. They symmetrical design of the side-gabled central section of the house features a three-bay composition with central doorway. A chimney at each end of the central section reinforces the symmetry. Departures from "correct" Georgian design include paired windows on either side of the door and a semi-circular portico that is derived from the Adam style. Unusual features of the main (south) facade are the small gables that extend the plane of the facade through the cornice above two of the second-story windows.

On the west side of the center section of the house, an original "hyphen"--defined by a row of three six-over-six, double-hung windows--connects to a "dependency" that contains the maid's quarters, which--though no longer used to house a servant--are largely unaltered. In the south end of the gable-roofed "dependency" is a large chimney, flanked on either side by small, multipaned windows. A wall dormer interrupts the cornice line on the east side of the "dependency."

The "hyphen" on the east side of the central section of the Cherry House originally was an open breezeway or porch but has been enclosed for use as a sunroom. The sunroom's jalousie windows are an obvious departure from the original design of the house.

The east "dependency," which does not perfectly balance the maid's quarters on the west because it is situated closer to the street, is a gable-roofed two-car garage. Interesting design conceits are four "bricked up windows," two in the gable above the garage doors and two on the rear (north) facade of the garage, which apparently never really were windows. They seemingly were designed to give "instant age" to the building, suggesting it had been altered over time.

At the rear of the Cherry House, two alterations are evident. On the east end of the rear facade, an addition was made to increase the size of the sunroom created when the original breezeway between the house and garage was enclosed. At the west end of the rear facade, a porch that ran along the north end of the maid's quarters has been enclosed.

The highlight of the interior of the Cherry House is the entry hall, where a curving stairway with Colonial-style detailing rises to the second floor. The wainscot along the stairway, and around the walls of the entry hall, is plaster designed to look like wooden paneling. A console table and mirror on the west wall of the entry hall enhance the Colonial design of the house.

Summary

Criteria A and C, local significance

Built in 1930 for Mr. and Mrs. Lewis W. Cherry, Jr., the Cherry House is architecturally significant as Edgemont's major example of the Colonial Revival style and as the most "correct" of the area's period revival houses. It also is unusual in being one of the few Edgemont houses whose history does not reflect much of the Depression's trauma because it original owners, unlike most of their neighbors, were able to weather the financial crisis without losing their home.

Elaboration

Lewis W. Cherry, Jr., an investment banker and son of a prominent Little Rock businessman, moved to Edgemont with his wife, Anne, in mid-1930. Theirs was one of the most expensive houses in the area, costing a total of nearly \$13,000 and requiring a monthly mortgage payments of \$137.50. Although information on the Cherry House still on file at Metropolitan Trust Company indicates the Cherrys did fall behind on their mortgage payments during the Depression years, their mortgage was not foreclosed, and they lived in Edgemont until about 1950.

Since the departure of the Cherrys, the house has belonged to just two more families. It presently is the home of the grandson of the woman who bought it in the late 1950's.

At the time the Cherry House was built, it represented quite a change in approach to the design of a house in Edgemont. Previous Edgemont homes were loose interpretation of assorted picturesque styles: Spanish Colonial Revival, French Eclectic, Monterey, English Revival. Though still in the period revival mode, the Cherry House's more correct and formal Colonial Revival design stood in considerable contrast to its Edgemont neighbors, contributing to its significance today.
