Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located on the west side of Griffin Street in the old suburban area west of downtown Moss Point, the A. F. Dantzler House is a one-story, frame, Queen Anne house situated on a generous 2.61-acre lot. The house rests upon brick foundation piers infilled with brick lattice except for the foundation wall which supports the octagonal porch projection. The dominant hipped roof with lower cross hips and gables was originally pierced by six brick chimneys, one of which has been cut off below the roof and two of which are broken off just above the roof. Two of the surviving chimneys are tall decorative chimneys with banding that are typical of the Queen Anne style. Architectural drawings for the pre-1915 addition illustrate a metal roof cresting and roof finials. An octagonal, dormer tower with tent roof and bracketed cornice is centered in the front slope of the roof above the entrance doorway. The house is clad with lap siding except for the gable ends and dormer tower which are shingled. The full width of the easterly facade is sheltered by a gallery which extends northerly to form an octagonal pavillion and extends southerly to wrap around the southeasterly corner and continue across the front of the later addition to form a porte-cochere at the southern end of the house. The gallery and porte-cochere are supported by bracketed turned posts that are linked by a spindle frieze and turned baluster railing. The entrance doorway is defined by a shallow gabled projection with ornamental scroll work in the gable end. The turned posts that support this projection are linked by panels of spindles that radiate from a central axis. Doorway and window openings on all elevations have wide surrounds with a molded drip cap. Except for the bathroom windows of the addition, which are filled with stained-glass pivot sash, window openings are filled with one-over-one, double-hung sash and were originally closed by shutter blinds, now missing.

Access to the interior is through a transomed doorway filled with a single-leaf door with beveled-glass upper panel that opens into a large room-like entry hall heated by a fireplace with Neo-classical mantel piece. The northern wall of the entry room features a paneled wainscoting of curly pine that continues on all walls of the rear L-shaped hallway that is separated from the entry by an opening defined by a spindle-work spandrel. Wide doorways filled with sliding doors connect both the entry room to the parlor on the north and the parlor to the dining room on the west. The northerly side of the house has a range of three rooms--parlor, dining room, and kitchen--that are separated by a narrow stair hall from the three bedrooms on the southerly side of the original portion of the house. Two of the bedrooms are separated by a hallway that leads to the pre-1915 addition containing a large master bedroom and two bathrooms. A single-flight open-string staircase with turned balusters and square paneled newel with finial runs in an easterly direction along the northerly stair hall wall and terminates in an attic storage area. The interior trim of the Dantzler House is fairly consistent with door and window surrounds symmetrically molded with corner blocks, bases molded with a single fascia, doors with five molded panels, and Neo-classical wooden mantel pieces. The trim of the entry room and L-shaped hallway varies in having molded panels beneath the windows, knee blocks in the

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The A. F. Dantzler House is one of Moss Point's most significant Queen Anne style residences based on its architectural finish, its integrity, and its association with the locally prominent Dantzler family. The rambling, one-story frame cottage was constructed in 1906 and enlarged before 1915 (A. F. Dantzler, Jr., interviewed by Mary W. Miller, preservation consultant, at Moss Point, Miss., August 25, 1986). The plans and specifications for the enlargement were prepared by New Orleans architect William Drago and are owned by the Dantzler family, who feel certain that Drago was also the architect of the original portion of the house. The house exhibits such typical Queen Anne features as a dormer tower, wraparound porch, porte-cochere, shingled siding, bracketed turned posts, spindle frieze, turned baluster railing, and applied scrollwork.

The Dantzler Lumber Company, established in 1887 by L. M. Dantzler, was one of the wealthiest corporations in southern Mississippi in the late nineteenth century (Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Mississippi [Chicago: The Goodspeed Publishing Company, 1891], I, p. 614-15) and continued to play a dominant role in the economy of the Gulf Coast region well into the twentieth century. The house was the residence for the family of A. F. Dantzler, son of L. M. Dantzler, until the 1920's when it was sold to the Alberts family. A. F. Dantzler, Jr. restored both the house and Dantzler family ownership with the recent acquisition and restoration of his childhood home. Home to only two families since its construction, the A. F. Dantzler House possesses outstanding integrity. The picturesque coastal cottage retains all original millwork, lighting devices, hardware, and plumbing fixtures. Its suburban setting is also largely intact with the retention of a 2.61-acre landscaped lawn.

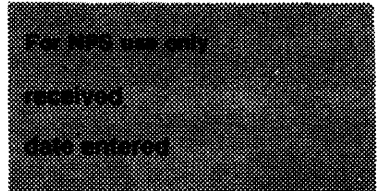

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surrounds, and curly pine surrounds and wainscoting. The dining room of the house is distinguished from the rest of the house by its paneled walls, modillioned cornice, and Tudor mantel piece.

The integrity of the Dantzer House is outstanding and includes the survival of all millwork, kitchen cabinets, bathroom fixtures, and hardware. Alterations are limited to the enclosure of a portion of the rear porch on the bedroom wing addition. No historic outbuildings remain.
