DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building located at 422 First Street, Eureka, California, known as the Janssen Building, is thirtyfour feet wide along First Street, and one hundred ten feet long, extending back the full length of the lot to the city alley. The building has two stories under a flat roof and is approximately thirty three feet high from sidewalk to top of parapet. The site has 100% building coverage, i.e. there are no yards or setbacks.

The Janssen Building is of the commercial type known as a loft building and is constructed of brick walls on a continuous brick foundation, wood frame floors, roof structure and interior bearing columns with a street facade featuring a wood frame, cast iron and glass store front. A full description of the structural system; including statements of the condition of the framing members and allowable loadings appears in a report by Winzler and Kelly Consulting Engineers, dated 20 April 1972, which is attached to this application.

The present exterior appearance shows a state of excellent preservation with only minor changes from the original condition. The ground floor store front is mostly glass in window recesses framed by cast iron pilasters with simple classic capitals. Cast into the base of each column is the identification " San Francisco Iron Works 1875 ". The entrance double doors are wood frame, sash type and appear to be original. The upper part of the street facade contains "punched" windows in deep recesses in the brick wall. A painted plaque reading "E. Janssen Building" is mounted above the windows in a bricked panel recess. Various brick dentil courses and corbels embelish the upper wall.

All of the windows were originally protected by exterior bi-fold iron shutters which folded back into the window recesses. The shutters are missing from the lower windows on the street elevation but remain intact on the other windows. The lower windows have cut granite sills. The building front is painted mustard with white and black trim in the spirit of the original architecture which is variously called the California Gold Rush style or the California Renaissance.

The interior of the building consists of two floors of open loft space with a row of wood columns down the middle of the room. Floors were untreated wood, walls and ceilings plaster and painted redwood tongue and groove boards. A minimum of classical motifs and trims accented the interior architecture. section of wall shelving and base cabinets executed in a restrained classical style with a track mounted ladder to reach the upper shelves. The interiors are quite authentic except that fire codes have required gypsum board to be installed over the wood ceiling finishes. Some office partitions have been removed and sanitary facilities have been installed.

The most conspicuous feature of the interior is a narrow mezzanine extending down the middle of the ground floor five feet on each side of the column line; and supported by the columns as well as by steel rods up to the ceiling framing. The mezzanine with its scroll work and fanciful turned spindles is probably a later, Victorian addition, but it gives the room the suggestion of a sailing ship. This is probably due to the rounded front end, and may have been a deliberate motive introduced when the building became a waterfront hardware supply store.

The interior colors are white field and deep green trim. The original wood floors of pine or fir have been cleaned and oil sealed.

In a region devoted to lumber and wood products it is a significant and long lasting reminder of the early days on the North Coast, where all too many historical structures have vanished, victims of fire, rot, neglect or "progress".

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built in 1875, the E. Janssen and Co. building was planned as the mercantile center of the North Coast area. Substantially constructed of brick and boasting a distinguished iron front which was shipped north from San Francisco, the structure housed the first elevator installed in the City of Eureka and it remained, for many years, the only elevator in the northern part of the state. Although no longer operational due to fire and building regulations, the original water powmered equipment still exists.

Laid out for the handling of general merchandise, the store room on the first floor contained elegantly conceived shelving and drawer space for the display and storage of **dr**y goods on one side, with heavier work to accommodate hardware and construction equipment on the other. The rear of the salesroom provided for groceries and necessary office space. The spacious second floor, reached via the prized elevator, afforded ample storage for stock.

In 1889, ownership of the building and the business passed into the hands of Hans Henry Buhne, an enterprising Eurekan who, until his death in 1894, was prominent in the affairs of the growing city.

As second officer on the ship Laura Virginia out of San Francisco it was Buhne who first entered the Bay of Humboldt (then known as Trinity) with a small crew in one of the ship's auxiliary boats. The date: 1850.

Returning to San Francisco, he resigned from the crew of the Laura Virginia, purchased supplies and a tent, returning to Humboldt where he opened the area's first hotel on May 5, 1850. From this small start Buhne, facing the inevitable problems of a raw, isolated land, went on to become one of the foremost business leaders of the town.

Upon acquiring the Janssen Building, Buhne developed the business into a ship's chandlery. With Eureka fast becoming a Pacific Coast shipbuilding port of significance, many of the coastal ships which bore the name Eureka as home port were outfitted from the Buhne Chandlery.

Within the past year the building fell vacant and it has now been rehabilitated, its handsome iron front restored to its original beauty.

It is slated to become an art and cultural center for the core area of the City of Eureka. As it has through its near century of existence, the structure will continue to play an important role in the life of the community.
