## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Nebraska City occupies the nearly level tableland situated between North and South Table Creeks which flow into the Missouri River at the east edge of town. The gentle slope of this land toward the river is in marked contrast to the bluffs which face the Missouri along most of its length in southeast Nebraska. This slope has provided easy access from the river to the Nebraska side as well as an ideal landing for steamboat activities in the nineteenth century. The (southwest) Nebraska City Historic District occupies a portion of the gentle, south facing slope to South Table Creek and what is known as Hail and Companies Addition to Nebraska City (see map #1).

Land use within the district is strictly residential with a small industrial tract at the south edge (see map #2). The area is bounded on the east and north by strip commercial development along U.S. Highway 73-75 and Central Avenue. Three square blocks of public school lands bound the western edge while South Table Creek terminates the southern edge.

The district is comprised of eighty-one buildings in nine and one-half square blocks of land (see map #4). Of these, 31% were built in the nineteenth century, 53% in the early twentieth century, 3% between 1920 and 1950, while 10% were built after World War II (see map #3).

The close relationship of late nineteenth and early twentieth century construction gives this district an 84% compatibility with respect to the historic character of the area. Modern structures associated primarily with the strip commercial development along the east and north and the school lands to the west, effectively isolate this area from other historic districts in Nebraska City (see Nebraska City Historic District and South Nebraska City Historic District - both submitted simultaneously with this nomination).

A contiguous historic environment exists within the district which has a strong focus along South 13th Street. All six sites chosen for discussion are located along either side of this street. The ordinary nineteenth century dwelling house comprises the character of the district; little of architectural distinction is represented. Justification for the area is based on this being the historic living environment of some of Nebraska City's more prominent business, professional and political figures and as an area which when viewed along with the other areas under consideration, will provide a more complete picture of Nebraska City, one of Nebraska's most important nineteenth century communities.

HISTORIC SITES INVENTORY (Map #4)

1. F. W. Rodenbrock house (1303 1st Corso): A two-story brick residence with a low pitched hip roof built for this prominent Nebraska City grocer ca. 1878. The house has a one and one-half story addition to the rear (south) of the house which was built by 1899. The full frontal porch was constructed by 1913, however the present enclosure represents recent work. The basic form and design of this dwelling is very similar to his friend and former employer's house, the F. W. Rottman house at 1118 1st Avenue (see Nebraska City Historic District nomination).
2. Whitten development house (223 South 13th Street): Perhaps the most distinctive house in the district, this one and one-half story residence was built by Dr. Elisha M. Whitten as a development property ca. 1896. Pleasing in form, the house is distinguished by the unique sawn wood ornament along the bargeboards.
3. Dr. Elisha M. Whitten house (1218 3rd Corso): A two and one-half story brick residence built in 1874 and substantially enlarged and remodeled ca. 1902 for this prominent Nebraska City physician. Originally a nineteenth century house of some pretention (a 1906 view shows East-lake derived porches on the west and south which were probably retained from the original structure), builder-architect D. C. Proper enlarged the house with equal pretention with the somewhat Queen Anne derived addition to the west. All detailing on the new addition, however, was from Georgian revival sources. Both the west and south porches have recently been modernized and the south porch has been enclosed.
4. John Mattes Jr. house (404 S 13th): This one and one-half story frame residence was built ca. 1890 for this local brewer and political figure. The house has been modified over the years especially in the stucco facing, the removal of the original wooden front porch and the alteration of the chimney. The brick foundation of this house is of the same color and texture as the First Baptist Church (see South Nebraska City nomination) and the Morton-James Public Library (see nomination).

5. John Mattes Sr. house (1222 6th Corso): This simple two and one-half story brick house with brick foundation was built ca. 1889 for the proprietor of the Mattes Brewing Co. The house has a hipped roof with a hipped dormer on the south and a U-shaped, full frontal porch of frame construction over the south entrance. D. C. Proper, the builder-architect, provided Georgian revival details for the eaves-cornice and the porch.
  
6. Mattes Brewing Company warehouse (southeast corner, 13th Street and 6th Corso): This one story brick structure was built ca. 1900 as a Bottling Storage warehouse for the Mattes Brewing Co. The building was west of the main plant which was founded by F. Beyschlag in 1858. The brewery was purchased and substantially enlarged by John Mattes Sr. in subsequent years. This is the only structure remaining in Nebraska City known to have been associated with the brewery industry.

The nature of the district is exemplified by the ordinary nineteenth century dwelling house (see photo #7). The very small percentage of more modern structures within this district does little to impair the basic character of the area. The most serious effect of modern development can be seen along Fifth Corso near Fourteenth Street where two contemporary dwellings are seen on adjacent lots (see photo #8). This small pocket of development could be seen more as reflecting the element of time within the district than as representing an intrusion in the district.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Nebraska City, which developed as a freighting town in the 1850's and 1860's, had become a very prosperous community by 1880. The town boasted several schools and churches, a newspaper, fire department, several banks, successful business houses and many manufacturing companies.

There were two breweries in Nebraska City, the first to be established being the Pioneer Brewery built in 1858 by Mr. Frederick Beyschlag, a German immigrant, along South Table Creek, at the southeast corner of 6th Corso and 13th Street.

In 1886 John Mattes Sr. moved his family to Nebraska City from Des Moines, Iowa where he had operated a brewery with his brothers for a number of years. Mattes bought Beyschlag's Pioneer Brewery and continued to conduct the business as president under the name of Mattes Brewing Company until prohibition, manufacturing Otoes Chief Beer. He erected his large brick house across the street north of his brewery.

John Mattes Jr., purportedly a nephew of John Sr., was also associated with the Mattes Brewing Company. He came with John Sr. from Des Moines in 1886. John Jr. filled various positions in the firm throughout the years, (i.e. treasurer, secretary and manager). John Jr. was quite active politically. He served as a representative to the Nebraska State Legislature in 1888 and was elected state senator in 1890 and 1892. For three years Mattes was a representative of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Berlin, having been appointed by J. Sterling Morton, then Secretary of Agriculture. In 1900 he was elected Mayor of Nebraska City.

Dr. Elisha Merritt Whitten, a prominent physician, moved into the southwest neighborhood in 1889, having arrived in Nebraska City in 1867. Dr. Whitten was a member of the Pathological Society, the Nebraska State Medical Society where he served as president in 1879 and was City Coroner. He was also the local surgeon for the Burlington and Missouri Pacific Railroad Co. and the physician for the School for the Blind located in Nebraska City.

In 1878, successful grocer F. W. Rodenbrock purchased the property at 13th Street and 1st Corso where he soon built his impressive home. A native of Germany, Rodenbrock came to Nebraska City in 1866 and began clerking for F. W. Rottman (see Nebraska City Historic District) in his grocery store. Mr. Rodenbrock soon went into business on his own and during his career was responsible for the building of two fine brick business blocks.

These men are very good examples of the "self-made" man. The Mattes' and Mr. Rodenbrock were all natives of Germany who came to America as young men with little finances. Dr. Whitten too, born in Maine, came to this newly settled country as a young man. By the end of the 1880's, all four men had gained the respect of their fellow townspeople as they grew successful in their careers. They were enjoying a prosperity by that time which enabled them to build the substantial homes which are contained in this nomination. Although all but one of the Mattes Brewing Company buildings are gone, the district remains much the same as it was in the nineteenth century.
