#### 7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated near Collins Landing on scenic State Highway One, just south of Anchor Bay, California, the O.W. Getchell House is a two-story rectangular structure of wood frame construction. It measures approximately 40' by 44'. Its roofline is dominated by intersecting gable roofs. The east and west gables end in broken pediments. The north-south roofline slopes gently to form front and rear porches. A small pedimented dormer is centered over the front (west) proch. A larger dormer is situated over a side (south) proch. A slanted bay window with original molding extends from the first floor, west elevation, centered below the gable. All windows are double hung sash with wood muntins, six over six light on the east elevation, two over two light on the first story south elevation, and one over one light elsewhere. The house is framed in redwood and sheathed in horizontal shiplap siding. The roof is of composition shingle.

Much of the interior of the eleven room house is in very original condition, including a cherry wood balustrade leading to the second floor, "car siding" wood ceilings, and two fireplaces. County building records suggest the structure was constructed ca. 1870.

The structure has been altered through the addition of a one-story frame leanto, which runs the length of the rear of the house. The integrity of the original exterior is not significantly affected by this addition and it is scheduled for removal.

Also on the property are two small board and batten sheds constructed ca. 1900. There is as well a small rectangular greenhouse, ca. 1940, located in a beautiful garden several hundred yards to the rear of the house. These small structures are not visible from the highway and do not detract significantly from the feeling of the nominated property.

The house is sited on a gentle slope about 75 feet above sea level in heavily wooded hills of redwood, madrone, and pine. The site has natural boundaries of a small creek with large trees along the northern side, a wooded embankment sloping to a small gully on the southern side, and on the west is bounded by State Highway One and bluffs leading to the Pacific Ocean. The property has deeded access to the beach across the highway at Collins Landing. The natural vegetation and trees on the two-acre site are all old growth, amny of the trees being contemporary with the principal strucutre.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The O.W. Getchell House, built ca. 1870, is significant in several respects: For its historical association with the California north coast redwood timber industry and the closely allied ocean trade between San Francisco and the north coast; And for its architectural statement as one of few wood frame structures which survived the 1906 earthquake and frequent forest fires in the area. Situated at the edge of the forest facing the sea, the Getchell House is an important visible link with the timbering and maritime history of this region of California. The house and lot retain a high degree of integrity to their appearance at the time of their greatest historical significance.

Osgood W. Getchell was a very early settler in this part of the California north coast. In the 1860s, he engaged in the business of cutting and selling redwood timber, timber which was important in the building of San Francisco and rebuilding it following the devestating quake and fire of 1906. Land tax records indicate that Getchell built this structure in about 1870, using redwood from the mill at Collins Landing just south of the house (See Appendix). Collins Landing was a loading point for lumber schooners and had several "log booms" for loading ship anchored offshore. By 1870, Getchell had acquired ownership of several lumber schooners and so sited his house to afford a view of the ocean cove and the landing. Local legend holds that he used the flagpole, still standing in the front yard, to signal his captains as they arrived offshore. Because of this siting high atop the ocean bluff and adjacent to the old stage road, the Getchell House has been a well-known local landmark for ships as well as land conveyances for more than a century,

The history of the communities of Gualala and Anchor Bay is intimately linked to the careers of such early pioneers as Getchell. The region historically relied upon the lumber schooners for its economic livelihoof as well as its communication link with the outside. Mr. Getchell's house, focal point for this vital economic activity, is thus significant for its association with persons and events contributing to the broad pattern of the region's history.

Architecturally, the house is pleasing in its spartan, symmetrical style, its clean workmanlike construction, its use of redwood, and its highly visible siting. It is one of very few "first-generation" homes surviving in this area. It retains most of its original fabric and character and is a noteworthy local landmark.
