Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The James M. Futch House is a one-story, wood-frame vernacular Greek Revival cottage, facing west on a tree-shaded rural tract on the east side of Dry Grove Road about 1½ miles south of Highway 18 and about 3 miles south of the town of Raymond. The house is composed as a symmetrical, porticoed main block, two rooms deep, with a galleried rear ell. The roof has side gables with cornice returns. The exterior walls are clad in weatherboards, except within the portico and the rear gallery, where they are surfaced with flushboard. The house sits upon low piers of local stone.

The façade is very similar to that of the Boteler House and Phoenix Hall (the Johnson-Harper House) in nearby Raymond (both of which were listed on the National Register in 1986). It is a five-bay composition consisting of a central doorway with two windows on each side, the three center bays of which are contained within a tetrastyle portico supported by simple box columns. The side bays are articulated by simple pilasters supporting a plain entablature that encircles the portico as well. The capitals of the columns and pilasters are trimmed with clusters of tiny decorative brackets. The double-leaf front door is set within a surround containing 4-pane sidelights and a rectangular 9-light transom surmounted by a slightly-peaked cornice. The windows have 6-over-6 double-hung sash framed by slightly-peaked architraves.

The plan of the main block of the house consists of two rooms on either side of a very wide center hall that is divided into two parts by original, paneled pocket doors. Closets and bathrooms have been inserted into the rooms, and it is thought that the hall may have been widened. A former resident of the house (Mrs. Sallie Long Dean, now of Clinton, MS, who lived in the house in 1918, interviewed by telephone by Barbara Kroeze, July 4, 1991) recalls that there were once chimneys in the two front rooms, but they no longer remain. Despite these alterations, the interior, which was always rather unadorned, retains much of its original moldings and detailing. In the rear ell some changes have also been made, but the moldings survive, as does the mantel in the rearmost room. A carport has been added to the rear of the ell.

The nominated property also contains one contributing outbuilding. This is a small log corncrib located a short distance behind the house. Built of hewn, square-notched logs (averaging about 8" x 14"), it rests on rough stone footings.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The James M. Futch House is locally significant as a work of architecture because it is one of the few surviving antebellum houses in rural Hinds County and is a relatively well preserved example of the vernacular Greek Revival cottages that were popular in Mississippi during the decade preceding the Civil War. Built around 1860, it is very similar to two houses in the nearby town of Raymond, the Lillian Boteler House and Phoenix Hall (the Johnson-Harper House), and may have had the same builder. (Both of these houses were listed on the National Register in 1986 as elements of the Raymond and Vicinity MRA. The Futch House was not included in the MRA submission because it is located a short distance outside of the MRA boundaries.)

James M. Futch was a locally prominent planter. Born in Georgia in 1811, he came with his parents to Mississippi in 1812 and to Hinds County in 1824. A biographical sketch of him in the Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Mississippi (Chicago: Goodspeed Publishing Co., 1891, Vol. I, pp 771-72) states that "most of his life has been spent on his plantation three miles from Raymond" but that he moved to a house in the town in 1875.

Verbal Boundary Description The nominated property consists of a rectangular tract of land located in the SE quarter of the NE quarter of Section 6, T4N, R2W, Hinds County, Miss. The northern boundary is a fence located about 100 feet north of the Futch House. The northwest corner is the point where this fence line intersects the right-of-way of Dry Grove Road. From this point the boundary extends eastward 410 feet along the fence line, then south 225 feet, then west about 410 feet back to Dry Grove Road, then north about 225 feet along Dry Grove Road to the beginning point. Boundary Justification


The boundary contains an area of approximately 2 acres that constitutes the immediate setting of the house and includes the outbuilding.
