DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Nixon Birthplace stands at the top of a hill above Yorba Linda Boulevard in the shelter of a modest grove of trees. About 30 yards west is the Yorba Linda elementary school, recently renamed after the President.

The main section of the frame bungalow is one-and-one-half stories in height with a shed dormer in evidence on the north side. The roof over the main section is gabled with a low pitch and covered with asphalt shingles. The rear of the house is one story in height with a flat roof and probably was created by enclosing a porch. The house has overhanging eaves and a shallow gabled vestibule in front. The clapboard siding is white, while window trim is in green.

Apparently the exterior of the house has not changed significantly in the past few decades. Maintenance appears to be at an acceptable standard. The present occupants are employees of the Yorba Linda School District.

The house is not open to the general public.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

Richard Nixon was born in Yorba Linda, California, on January 9, 1913, in a modest one-and-one-half-story frame house built by his father, Frank Nixon, who earned his living by fruit farming. The future President lived in the house until 1922, when the Nixon family moved to Whittier. Especially important during these formative years was the example of his Irish Quaker parents. Remembering the lessons learned from them in Yorba Linda, the President recently remarked,

their patience, courage and determination not to break down, whatever the physical and emotional strain, has been one of the finest things I have ever known. And it has certainly held me together at times when I have been under pressure. And it always will.

The little-altered house at 18061 Yorba Linda Boulevard is owned by Yorba Linda School District and is not open to the public.

Richard Nixon was born in Yorba Linda, California, on January 9, 1913, in a one-and-one-half-story frame house built by his father, Frank Nixon, who earned his living by raising citrus fruits.

The Nixons were active in the civic and religious life of the community and imparted their social consciousness to their five sons. Mrs. Nixon was a charter member of the Yorba Linda Women's Club, and she and her husband helped to organize the Yorba Linda Friends Church, where Richard attended Sunday school.

Nixon began public school in Yorba Linda and finished the third grade before the family moved to Whittier. His second grade teacher recalled that he "was a nice little boy who was serious about his studies," and that "he was well liked by other students, loved sports, was the center of everything and always willing to help other students."

These were the formative years in the life of the President-to-be. Remembering the early lessons he learned from his parents in Yorba Linda, Nixon recently remarked:

8. Significance

I do not have my parents' passivity, and I do not go along entirely with that philosophy, but the sight of their patience, courage and determination not to break down, whatever the physical and emotional strain, has been one of the finest things I have ever known. And it has certainly held me together at times when I have been under pressure. And it always will.

The Nixons left Yorba Linda for Whittier in 1922, when farming proved unprofitable. In the years that followed, the house passed through the hands of several owners. After World War II, Yorba Linda School District purchased the home to provide space for future expansion. Although threatened by destruction a number of times, the house continued to survive intact, and on January 9, 1959, the school board and the citizens of Yorba officially designated the home a historic site.
