Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

White's Chapel (1894) is a small wood frame Gothic Revival church located in an open rural setting on Bayou Boeuf approximately nine miles south of the town of Bunkie. Since construction the church has apparently undergone only one major alteration. This has not adversely affected its architectural integrity.

The four bay basilican plan chapel has a large front gable, a single square corner tower, and a rectangular apse. The bays and the tower are set off by multiple tier, paneled buttresses. The clapboard surface is broken by lancet arches with inset, square head, two over two plate glass windows. The front of the nave is lit by a set of three such windows. The clapboard surface is also broken in the upper portion of the front gable by an area of vertical boards superimposed with wood members which are designed to suggest a king post and struts. The tower is surmounted by a squat pyramid roof. The church is entered through the base of the tower. The double doors are original.

There is nothing Gothic about the interior. It is large and plain, with more or less standard late-nineteenth century woodwork.

Assessment of Integrity:

It appears that sometime in the twentieth century the nave ceiling was lowered. This change, however, has not adversely affected the building's architectural integrity because the church's significance is based entirely upon its exterior Gothic styling.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Criterion C

:

White's Chapel is locally significant in the area of architecture because it is the finest of a limited number of Gothic Revival style ecclesiastical buildings in St. Landry Parish.

St. Landry, a large rural parish, is mainly noted for its historic residences. However, the state's Historic Standing Structures Survey reveals that the parish also has approximately twenty major ecclesiastical structures, five of which are in the Gothic Revival style. Of these five, White's Chapel is undoubtedly the finest because:

- (1) It features fairly elaborate buttressing and, in fact, is the only example to feature buttressing at all.
- (2) It is one of only two which feature lancet windows.
- (3) It is one of only two examples which have a tower. Of the two towers, the one at White's Chapel is the more elaborate. The other tower is relatively plain with no buttresses or arches.
- (4) It is the only one with a distinctive architectural reference to a medieval king post roof.

The Gothic Revival was a prevalent style for ecclesiastical architecture throughout the United States during the nineteenth century. White's Chapel represents the high water mark of its achievement in St. Landry Parish.
