Original siding. Brick Chimneys. Four rooms on each floor with central hall. 11' ceilings. Joists are 12" to 14" thick and are pegged together. Near the main house are two barns, both over 75 years old, and an implement shed. There are two more large barns and 3 smaller sheds on the farm, which is still in use. Excellent condition. HISTORY Current Use Residence for farm superintendent Historic Use Residence, farm, and stage stop Construction Date c. 1830 Architect/Builder Billy Felton Date of Alterations (cont'd) Historical Narrative: William "Billy" Felton moved to the Marshallville area in 1820 from Gates County, N.C. He settled on the stage road from Lanier to Perry, where he built the "Billy Place." In the 1850's, Felton donated land for the railroad right-of-way with a stop at Winchester. He served as an agent for the railroad. Six generations of Felton's have owned the "Billy Place." SIGNIFICANCE Settlement; Architecture; Areas of Significance Agriculture; Transpor- Statement of Significance: tation The Billy Place is one of the earliest remaining buildings in the Marshallville vicinity. William Felton's cotton production in the area encouraged new settlement plus helped establish the region's agricultural system. Architecturally, the Billy Place is a good example of 1830's vernacular architecture as built throughout this part of Georgia. 
