Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Anna C. Diller Opera House is located on the northwest corner of the intersection of Commercial and Hilton, at the edge of the downtown district of Diller. Built by the widow of one of the founders of the town, William H. Diller, it was erected as something of a monument to her memory, one appreciated by the town, according to the December 20 Diller Record in 1912: "While it is doubtful if such a building in a town the size of Diller will pay, it will be a great boon to the town and will cause Mrs. Diller to be held in grateful remembrance by the citizens for many years to come."

The three-story brick, rectangular building has a hipped roof and full basement. The Two-Part Commercial Block incorporates design elements found in Second Renaissance Revival style architecture. The building exterior is organized into horizontal divisions by pronounced stone belt courses. The first level features typical ground floor facades on two retail establishments. The main entrance to the opera house is located on the east side of the first level, through a single door and up stairs to the second floor. On the second level, the main facade displays round arched openings with keystone ornaments atop the one-over-one pane windows, arranged symmetrically across the front facade. The third level features small attic-story windows, also symmetrically arranged, reflecting the balcony area in the interior space. The main facade shows a raised panel, inscribed with "Anna C. Diller, 1912." The roof was built for tiles, but has been asphalt sheet since the 1980s. The building is 44 feet wide by 120 feet long. The box office remains in the northeast corner of the auditorium, just under the balcony overhang, in front of the stairs leading to the balcony.

The auditorium is 42 feet wide by 67 feet long from the proscenium opening to the back wall. The walls were decorated by Charles Hansen and James Willer of the Diller firm of Hansen & Willer, who also decorated both the Paddock Hotel and Paddock Opera House in Beatrice, as well. The walls were decorated with grape motifs and bands of diamond-shaped patterns. The ceiling decor included motifs of lilies, roses, bands, and ribbons in shades of blue, green, yellow and pink. The artists used both stencil work and free-hand painting in their art process. The ceiling shows some water damage. As a result of this damage, plaster litters the chairs, floor, and steps. The chairs and floor are also heavily coated with bird droppings. The balcony area, which was never finished, later served as a projection booth; a makeshift partition separates its view from the main auditorium. The balcony extends 33 feet, 8 inches from the Commercial Street wall of the building, extending about four feet over the rear of the auditorium. The

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balcony, which has a sloping floor, was never furnished with seats because the project ran out of money before construction was completed. Three large rooms fill the space immediately under the balcony, behind the auditorium. Permanent opera house chairs fill the main level of the auditorium, which is raked (photo #6); those in the dress circle are upholstered. The chairs have sustained considerable damage to their finish due to inadequate care of the facility. Seating capacity is approximately 400.

The proscenium arch measures 20 feet wide by 14 feet high, with wings of 11 feet extending beyond the opening on each side. Storage space exists in the angles created by the parameters of the stage wall (see photo #3). Small, nonfunctional boxes allow direct access to the stage from the auditorium, while a door on the stage right side allows access to the backstage area. The small orchestra pit, about four feet wide, extends between each of these nonfunctional boxes, curling around the 3-foot apron. Wainscoting decorates this entire area opening to the back wall. Makeshift dressing rooms are backstage on the stage left side, with permanent storage above them. One trap door exists stage right rear.

The structural and historical integrity of the building and theatre has been preserved.


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Floor plan, Anna C. Diller Opera House, Diller

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Anna C. Diller Opera House is significant for its association with and in reference to the historic context "Aesthetic Systems: Itinerant and Local Performing Arts in Nebraska" and the property type of "Opera House Buildings in Nebraska, 1867 to 1917." Under Criterion A, this opera house is significant in the areas of the performing arts and social history, on a state level, as a well preserved example of an opera house building in Nebraska. The building retains a high degree of historical integrity, possessing the physical and associative characteristics to make it an eligible member of its property type.

This opera house is significant in the area of performing arts for bringing a variety of entertainment to the community of Diller. As a facility for the performing arts, it offered productions such as touring stock companies, minstrel shows, musical concerts, and home talent shows. (See following table of Representative Entertainments 1912-1917.)

This opera house is significant in the area of social history because it gave Diller a neutral, nonaffiliated location for Decoration Day exercises, commencements, and Lyceum Club meetings. (See following table of Representative Entertainments 1913-1917.) In the days before radio, television, and sound movies, activities at the opera house were anticipated for days or weeks ahead of time. It provided a place for people to get together to have a good time and forget their troubles over crops, weather, taxes, the railroads, and the generally hard life of settling the Great Plains.

The period of significance is derived from the original construction date of the building, 1912, the same year that Loock's 1880s opera house burned down. The period of significance continued through 1917, the year considered to signal the end of the opera house era in Nebraska, based on declining numbers of touring companies nationally and rising numbers of movie houses and automobiles. Besides competition from Diller's own Electric (movie) Theatre by 1917, the proximity of the larger towns of Fairbury (12 miles) and Beatrice (21 miles), both of which had large auditoriums able to offer major entertainments, and moving picture theatres

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by 1917, meant that as more Diller residents bought cars, activities in those nearby cities became a viable option. Limited choices in the Anna C. Diller Opera House doomed it to a dwindling number of sporadic events. In the case of the Anna C. Diller Opera House, it is interesting to note that newspaper references at the time the facility was constructed noted that "it is doubtful if such a building in a town the size of Diller will pay," but that "Mrs. Diller ... proposes to leave the town a substantial monument to her memory."
