### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Woolwich Town House, built in 1837 by William D. Leonard, is a rectangular frame building on a brick foundation, with gable roof (covered with asphalt shingles), clapboard siding, and granite foundation. A small brick chimney is present, located near the north end of the building on the east side of the roof ridge. The structure consists of one story, with loft overhead.

The main facade, in the gable end, faces south. Twin entrances are present, framed in Doric pilasters with simple entablatured lintel above. Each entrance contains a single doorway of seven panels with a transom light of four panes. Between the entrances are three windows, the central one of which is slightly higher than the other two. All windows in the building are six-over-six double-hung sash.

The east and west sides of the town house are three bays wide, in both cases featuring three 6/6 windows, even-spaced.

Above the central window on the main facade is a rectangular wooden sign carrying the message: "WOOLWICH TOWN HOUSE/1837".

Both internally and externally, the Woolwich Town House is a well-preserved rural example of a simple yet dignified public building type common on the early 19th-century landscape of Maine. As an unaltered survival, it is a fine representative of its class.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Woolwich Town Hall, unaltered from its original spartan simplicity, survives as a classic example of fural public architecture of the first half of the 19th century in Maine. Built in 1837 by vote of the town, it replaced the local meeting house as the site of town meetings and other non-religious gatherings.

Of particular interest is the fact that the building was built with funds arising out of the distribution of the Federal surplus beginning in 1836.

By 1835 the national debt was finally liquidated for the first time, but additional funds still poured into the Federal Treasury. This revenue flowed principally from the customhouses which were benefiting from the high tariff duties and the heavy imports resulting from a boom in the economy. In 1836 Congress passed a bill authorizing the distribution of the surplus above \$5,000,000 among the states. President Jackson, who had pocket vetoed a similar bill in 1833, approved the bill which became effective on January 1, 1837.

The surplus was to be "deposited" with the States in proportion to the number of their representatives in both houses of Congress. The deposit was supposedly subject to recall at the pleasure of the Secretary of the Treasury. The real intention was to make a present to the States, but the law provided for a deposit to satisfy the scruples of some Senators and Representatives who denied the constitutional rights of Congress to give away the public money.

The Maine Legislature voted that the money thus received be divided among the towns and plantations, according to population. The towns and plantations were permitted to use the money for any purpose for which money raised by taxation might be used or to loan on ample security.

On September 11, 1837, the Town of Woolwich, in town meeting, voted: "That this town receive its proportion of the money which is or may be deposited with this state by the United States, in pursuance of an Act to regulate the deposit of public money apportioned to the State of Maine, on deposit, by the Government of the United States."

and

"That 800 Dollars of the surplus money be appropriated for building a town house."

Thus the Woolwich Town House stands both as a pure example of its kind and as an evidence of one use to which the surplus public monies of the United States were put.
