

However, during the period of major building and economic expansion, the wealthy and established second generation moved into the Bluegrass areas of the county. Both John and Dr. Samuel Martin settled in this area. Later in the century, this farm was a prime stock raising farm owned by W. W. Taylor and was comprised of 249 acres. The third generation of the prominent Tebbs and Taylor families purchased the land and this became the Tebbs farm.

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Major John Martin House, a late eighteenth century brick dwelling, is located six miles west of Winchester in rural Clark County in the heart of the Bluegrass region of the state. The house is set on a 220-acre farm, attractively placed some 650 feet from Basin Springs Road, which it now formally faces.

The house is 1 1/2 stories, of brick set on a stone foundation. Displaying classical symmetry, the house is five bays in width with a central entrance. Originally the residence faced southeast toward Todd's Road; however, in the late nineteenth century when Basin Spring Road was built, the formal entrance of the house was reversed. The features of the dwelling bespeak its early construction date (ca. 1790), such as the use of Flemish bond brickwork on the southeast facade and gauged jack arches over all the bays. The central entrances on the front and rear walls are identical, with four-light transoms above the doorways and six-pane lights to each side. On the northeast wall are two small upstairs windows centered between the chimneys. On the southwest wall there are also two upstairs windows but they are set slightly off center.

The house exhibits a double-pile central passage plan. A pair of identical enclosed staircases-one located on each side of the north end of the hall--is perhaps the most distinctive feature of the interior. Much of the original interior woodwork has survived, including chair rail, door surrounds, cupboards, and mantels.¹ The trim is plain but attractive in its simplicity.

On the second floor are four rooms, two with original mantels. Original chair rail also survives. An unusual feature is a small room situated above the stairway with an opening on each side, permitting a view of the stairway.

In 1970 the present owners completed a restoration of the main block, adding wings to give needed additional space. The sensitive rehabilitation was designed by architect Charles Bayless to preserve as much of the original fabric of the main block as possible without disturbing the floor plan. One-story wings were attached to the side walls of the main block and were recessed from the front facade. The wings extend southward, projecting from the rear wall to give maximum space without detracting from the front (north) facade facing Basin Spring Road.

The house sits surrounded by open fields. The frontage and rear yard, composed of about ten acres, is largely enclosed in fencing. No historic outbuildings remain. Tennis courts are located 139 feet to the rear

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Located in one of Kentucky's earliest settled areas, the Major John Martin House survives as a remarkably intact example of Federal styling. This one and one-half story brick residence conforms to the classical symmetry characteristic of late 18th-early 19th century buildings constructed in Clark County. Original interior woodwork, including door surrounds, mantels, chair rail and baseboards indicate plain but wellexecuted Federal-period embellishments typical of the period. The residence was built c. 1790 by Major John Martin (1748-1837), Clark County's first sheriff and a judge of the quarterly court. Martin's son, Dr. Samuel Martin (1791-1881), a noted local physician and founder of the Clark County Medical Society, also resided in the house.

Born in Albermarle County, Virginia, John Martin was a captain in the second Virginia Line during the Revolutionary War and was promoted to major at Yorktown. He emigrated to Kentucky in 1784, residing first in Jessamine County (1784 to 1788) and eventually settling on Boone Creek in the Pine Grove community. The area selected was exceedingly fertile, indicated by its early settlement.¹

In 1792 Martin was appointed Clark County's first sheriff by Governor Isaac Shelby. Local prominence was also indicated by the fact that he served as quarterly court judge from 1796 to 1798. Upon his resignation from the court, Major Martin retired to private life to devote his time to farming. He raised shorthorn cattle and was one of the early importers of purebred stock.

Major Martin's son Samuel is said to have been born in the house January 17, 1791. He studied medicine at Transylvania University in





of the house. Approximately 509 feet to the northeast of the house, beside a barn, is the Martin family cemetery containing the graves of the builder, John Martin, his wife, and other family members. An early stone fence encloses the graveyard.

In order to preserve the ambience of this rural resource, the boundary is drawn to encompass sufficient footage on the four sides of the house to establish its agricultural/rural identity. Therefore, the nominated area extends 90 feet from the southwest wall of the main house; 139 feet from the southeast wall; 627 feet to the south side of Basin Spring Road; and 553 feet from the northeast wall to include the family cemetery. Lexington, after which he moved to Winchester, county seat of Clark County, and practiced medicine there from 1815 to 1825. Martin later moved to the family home in Pine Grove where he opened a medical office. According to local sources, the office was placed in a building on the northwest side of the house. (There is an outline of a door visible in the patched brick on the northwest side to enable easy access to Dr. Martin's office. It is thought that the wing was razed in 1900.)

The main block of the house has experienced few changes. The interior trim is remarkably intact. Because of its value as a local interpretation of the Federal style, and its state of preservation, the Major John Martin House serves as one of Clark County's important historic resources.





to the visual aspects of this rural/agricultural resource; using the fencing as the southwest boundary; extending eastward to include the barn and Martin family cemetery; and southward to encompass domestic space, stopping just north of the tennis court.

Beginning at Point A (see maps 1 and 2) on the south side of Basin Spring Road 600' northeast of the Martin house entrance drive, the line proceeds 800' southeastwardly to Point B. Turning in a southwestward direction, the line extends some 743' to Point C, turning northwestwardly 800' to Point D on the south side of Basin Spring Road. The boundary then extends along the south side of Basin Spring Road in a <code>eastwardly</code> direction to Point A and the place of beginning.


Clark County John Mantin House Not to Seale


