



The Jackson Hall Memorial Building (known as the Scout Hall) is a two-story log building, located on a gently sloping site about four blocks from the center of old Silverdale. Built as a Works Progress Administration (WPA) project in 1936, the hall has been used for a variety of community functions over the years.

The Jackson Hall Memorial building is rectangular in plan and measures approximately sixty feet across the front (east) elevation and forty feet along the sides. A poured concrete foundation rises to form part of the first story walls, continuing to various heights on each elevation. Above the foundation the full logs are laid and joined at the corners, creating saddle notches with crowns. The logs are placed round on round with chinking.

A large external chimney of rough cut stone rises against the south elevation. Fenestration consists of rectangular openings placed singly at regular intervals on all elevations except the south. Two entries, at the northeast corner and the southwest corner, have double doors of halved logs with iron hinges, and are sheltered by gable roofs supported by pole braces. The porch gables are covered with wood shingles, but the original shingles of the main roof have been replaced with corrugated metal roofing.

The interior of the hall has a single undivided upper floor with a large stone fireplace and fir flooring (installed after World War II), which is used for meetings and dances. The lower floor includes a dining area, kitchen and restrooms. Overall, the interior retains good integrity.

Alterations to the building and to its site are minimal. The original gravel parking lot surrounding the property has since been paved. In order to prevent vandalism to original wood sash, all the original multi-paned windows have been removed and boarded up. The windows are in storage and will be reinstalled as the building is restored. The original cedar shake roof was replaced in the late 1940s with a corrugated metal roof.

Constructed in 1936, and assisted by a grant from the WPA, the Jackson Hall Memorial Building is a Rustic Style two-story log structure significantly associated with the community life of Silverdale, Washington. Since its construction, the hall has served as the home of local scout troops and the Izaak Walton League, also the site of a wide variety of community events and entertainments. Except for the corrugated metal roof, the hall retains its original character and continues to fulfill its original function. It is the strongest reminder of the early twentieth century heritage of Old Silverdale, and the best preserved example of full log construction in the local context.

Historical Background: Silverdale is a small unincorporated community on the central Kitsap Peninsula, first platted in 1889. In the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, the community was a service center for the surrounding district of farmers, loggers, and fishermen. The town included a compact commercial center, but lacked a large public hall for civic groups.

The need for a public meeting facility was perceived by Jackson Hall, a long time Silverdale resident and member of the local chapter of the Izaak Walton League. Upon his death in 1933, Hall bequeathed his entire estate -- \$200.00 and three lots near the downtown district -- to the Silverdale community for construction of a public meeting place. To receive the bequest, members of the Isaak Walton League and troop committeemen from the Boy Scouts incorporated the Jackson Hall Memorial Association on May 22, 1933.

Although the location of the lots was ideal, Hall's bequest did not include sufficient capital to construct a new building without further funding. To secure the necessary funds, the association applied for a grant from the federal Works Progress Administration. The WPA, which was a major component of Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal, was established in 1935 and provided funding for public works projects that created jobs for the unemployed. Throughout the Depression, WPA helped projects took place in many Washington communities and ranged from infrastructure repair to major new construction. Most of the structures employed local materials and were designed in an idiom characteristic of the region.

In Silverdale, WPA funding for the scout hall was complicated because federal rules required that money be granted to a municipal corporation. Because Silverdale was unincorporated, the Jackson Hall Association, in April 18, 1936, conveyed the three lots to the newly incorporated Silverdale

Water District #16 -- the only Municipal corporation in town -- on the condition that the land be held in trust for the association and "used only for recreational purposes, and for the promotion of the interests of the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Izaak Walton League, and other community purposes." The association also secured the assistance of United States Representative Warren G. Magnuson, who was instrumental in winning the grant. The new structure was designed by association volunteers in a Rustic idiom using full log construction, reflecting the pioneer architecture of the Kitsap Peninsula. The building was constructed in 1936, and dedicated in July, 1937, with an address by Representative Warren G. Magnuson.

Under the conditions of the deed, the Water District owned the building, the association maintained it, and various civic groups made use of it. The first tenant of the new building was the local Boy Scout Troop, under the leadership of Scoutmaster Jack Wyatt (who also served as president of the association). The scouts remained permanent tenants, only vacating the building during World War II when the structure was used as headquarters for an anti-aircraft battalion, which manned a gun battery on nearby Newberry Hill.

The scouts were soon joined by a variety of local youth groups, including the Cub Scout, Girl Scouts, and Camp Fire Girls. Church groups made use of the building on a temporary basis during periods of church construction or remodeling. The structure also has served as an entertainment center, with dances and other benefits held in the large upstairs dance hall. Finally, the hall provided a central meeting place for public agencies and other organizations conducting official meetings.

The diverse use of the hall, by a variety of community groups, has clearly fulfilled the intentions of the benefactor. Throughout the years, the building has been maintained by the volunteer efforts of association members and the local Boy Scouts. Today, the building is the best preserved symbol of Silverdale's community life and one of the few unaltered historic structures in Old Town Silverdale. Silverdale is in an area of the Kitsap Peninsula that is under intense development pressure. In the midst of a ten-year growth spurt which has left numerous shopping malls, national department stores and fast food restaurants, and residential development, the hall remains a strong witness to the early heritage of the Kitsap Peninsula.

Today the Scout Hall is still the home of the Boy Scout Troop, several square dance clubs, Rainbow Girls, Vineyard Christian Fellowship, Kitsap Aquarium Society and a central meeting place for public agencies and other organizations conducting official meetings. The Scout Hall is in use almost every evening. The Scout Hall and the Jackson Hall Memorial Association will soon begin a restoration effort to return the building to its original condition.
