DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Deuel County Courthouse in Clear Lake, South Dakota is a three story Renaissance Revival style building, constructed in 1916. Built of Bedford limestone at a cost of \$75,000, the courthouse is three bays long and three bays wide. The front (north) entrance has limestone steps leading up to the double leaf metal sheathed doors, which have single panels of glass. Sidelights and a transom accompany the doors. The entrance has two Doric columns supporting a denticulated cornice with carved limestone brackets. A small limestone balustrade, featuring a cartouche, rests atop the entrance. Two fluted Corinthian pilasters surround a large picture window with sidelights and a transom on each of the two upper stories. Carved limestone ornamentation appears to either side of the pilasters and to either side of a cartouche in the attic. Hodillions encircle the entire building.

Rectangular double sash windows are set in wood casings and have keystones. The rear (south) entrance has double doors with a plate glass window and sidelights above it on the second floor. The third story has an arched window. A low pitch roof covers the courthouse, and a large red brick circular chimney looms atop the building. Limestone quoins decorate the corners.

The interior of the building features a central dome that is not readily visible from the street. No additions and no major remodeling projects have altered the building's appearance. The courthouse is in good condition, but the wood casings need to be replaced.

The Deuel County Jail, constructed in 1899, is a two story brick building with a medium pitch hip roof. Asphalt shingles cover the roof. The cutstone foundation is badly in need of tuck pointing. A flat-roofed two story addition is attached to the west wall of the house, which was built according to no particular style. Windows are rectangular and double hung. Decorations include a dentil course of lap brick and a one story engaged hip roofed porch with Victorian trim. A one story bay window decorates the south wall of the original section of the house. The jail is in fair condition and needs some repair work.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

1916

The present Deuel County Courthouse, designed by architects Buechner and Orth and built by the A.M. Wold Construction Company, is a handsome Renaissance Revival style building unspoiled by alterations and additions. Its Renaissance Revival facade is a good example of a style of architecture frequently seen on public buildings constructed in the early days of South Dakota. On the interior, as well as the exterior, it remains much as it was when constructed. The Bedford limestone building material also is frequently seen on public buildings in this area.

Although not the first Deuel County Courthouse, this building has been the seat of county government since 1916. It "... is a far cry from the first courtnouse that figured in a prolonged and bitter county seat war, settled finally in 1890. Gary...and Clear Lake were the principals in the contest. Clear Lake was situated in the approximate center of the county; but Gary was the older town, and in addition, had been presented with a new courthouse by the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad. When the battle ended, Clear Lake had won, and Gary's new courthouse slowly began to fall into a state of desuetude."

One of sixty-seven county courthouses of widely divergent styles and ages in the state, the Deuel County Courthouse is representative of the Renaissance Revival style popular on the prairie around the turn of the century.

The Deuel County Jail is one of a vanishing breed of county jails also serving as the sheriff's residence and located adjacent to the county courthouse. Unless an acceptable adaptive use can be found for it, the jail will probably be destroyed in the near future.
