### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Algood Methodist Church faces State Route 42 in Algood approximately one block southwest of the town hall. It stands in a residential area and does not have the adjoining cemetery so customarily found associated with rural nineteenth century churches.

The frame church is cased with weatherboards painted white and covered with a composition shingle roof. A one-story frame schoolhouse built in 1894 was moved from a nearby location and attached to the rear (southeast) wall of the church ca. 1914; this part of the building now serves as a fellowship hall and church office.

The facade, northwest elevation, is accented by one large window composed of a pair of windows separated vertically and divided horizontally by wooden mullions and surmounted by a fanlight. All are glazed stained glass installed in 1909. Attached to the corner of the church is a two-story bell tower; the first story contains the entrance door and vestibule and the second story houses the bell which was installed in 1909. Its pyramidal roof with flaring eaves is covered with pressed metal shingles.

The northeast elevation is punctuated by four regularly spaced, double-hung windows which balance three identical windows and the entrance from the vestibule to the sanctuary of the southwest side of the building. All of these windows are glazed with textured glass.

The interior of the church retains almost all of its original treatment and finishes. The original Gothic Revival pews are still used, and the king-post-with-struts roof system has never been concealed. Narrow, vertical beaded-board wainscoting, so typical of rural churches of this vintage, remains in place at Algood Methodist Church, and the woodwork retains its original varnish. The original altar rail and pulpit furniture are treated in a similar manner.

The connecting fellowship hall has been adapted to serve the modern needs of the congregation and retains none of the features from its original use as a schoolhouse.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In 1880 the Tennessee Central Railroad tracks were completed to the site known as Algood. A community named for the Scottish founder Joel Algood, came into being to serve as a hub of trade and transportation for the Upper Cumberland Region.

In 1894, several families of Algood organized a Sunday School in a one-room schoolhouse completed the same year. Inspired by American Methodist circuit riders, the families built the Algood Methodist Church in 1899. The church, the first in the community, was shared by the Methodist, Baptist, Church of Christ, and Presbyterian congregations for many years. Negroes were early accepted for membership.

In 1909, a tornado considerably damaged the roof and removed the building from its foundation, but the membership repaired it. During 1914-1919, the one-room schoolhouse was moved to the site of the church and became Fellowship Hall. In 1942 and 1970, respectively, the Algood Civitan Club and the Algood Lion's Club were organized in the Church.

The Algood United Methodist Church is the oldest surviving church building in Putnam County, the oldest surviving quasi public building in Algood, and the only surviving nineteenth century church in Putnam County.

It is an excellent example of the type of frame Victorian church frequently found in the countryside in other parts of the state; but in Putnam County this one is unique, architecturally, and has occupied an unequaled place in community life in that town. Fortunately, it has survived in virtually original condition.
