17. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING OR SITE (interior and/or exterior):

The rubble stone walls of this cottage are equal to the walls of Taylor's large houses in structure and ruggedness. The windows are in deep reveals under thick, heavy stone lintels. They have small, leaded, square panes. The plan is a rectangle perpendicular to the lake with a short ell to the south. In both the principal section and the ell, three levels of gable roof build up toward the corner where there is a square tower with hipped roof, and pyramidal roof on top. There are vertical boards in the gable ends. An exterior stone staircase ascends to a second floor bedroom. The camp is sited a few feet above the lake and behind a re-
