## ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION Summary

The Hotel Cuba located at 600 East Main Street in Cuba, Crawford County, Missouri, is a two-story, front parapet roof, rectangular-shaped building constructed of red brick and completed originally as the Palace Hotel in 1915. The building has a primary entrance to the south (in association with the railroad) and at the north (in association with Route 66). A flat roof porch on brick piers at the south elevation continues to the east; a second porch assembly is at the north. Multiple window penetrations in addition to entrances are at each elevation. A ghost sign "Hotel Cuba" is at the south parapet. The interior is currently used as rental apartments and is currently accessed via the Railroad entry at the south elevation. It contains long circulation corridors at the first and second stories with rooms radiating from the halls. The building is surrounded by a grassy area and parking lot and has sidewalk paving up to the entrance along the south. Although all of the windows are either replacement or boarded, the new infill respects the dimensions of the original fenestration. The building has sufficient integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association.

#### Site

The Hotel Cuba occupies the southeast corner of a rectangular-shaped city block at the intersection of East Main Street and an un-named street. Mature trees are north of the Washington elevation. The lot surrounding the property is grass and gravel but otherwise not landscaped. Residential, institutional and commercial properties occupy the block.

#### **Exterior**

The Hotel Cuba is a two-story red brick structure with a primary entrance at the south (in association with the railroad); this symmetrical façade has a central door flanked by sidelights (photo 1). At either side are three windows, four are boarded while two have single replacement sash. A full width flat roof porch on brick posts with simple wood capitals shelters the façade. Above, a central door with access to the roof is flanked by a single sash replacement and a boarded window at either side. A band of brighter red brick bears the ghost sign "Hotel Cuba" under a projecting, but flat parapet roof (photos 1-2).

The porch wraps around to the east side and terminates at the fourth column above an entrance and replacement window. Columns have wider bases with concrete caps under ¼ height of the ground. Eleven additional replacement windows, either double-hung or boarded are at the first and second floors. Windows are of the same

size, both height and width and are set back from the brick (photo 2). An exposed concrete foundation supports the brick walls and a stepped parapet roof crowns the elevation (photos 2-3).

A one-story shaped parapet brick addition is at the north elevation (in association with Route 66) and has a similar flat roof porch on brick piers without widened bases. The porch shelters the facades beneath and extends outward from the footprint of the building above a concrete base to the north and east (photos 3 and 4). A replacement entrance door faces east in the one-story portion with paired double-hung replacement windows at either side. An additional similar entrance is at the north wall and is flanked at the right side by a pair of wider, similar windows and at the left by a pair of narrower and similar windows (photo 4). The west wall of the small addition has a closed in window and a smaller, double-hung replacement closest the original part of the building (photo 4). Above at the second story of the original building is an entrance flanked by a boarded window at either side with access on top of the lower addition roof (photo 4). A steep, side-gabled roof wraps the parapet (photos 3-4). The roof above is flat.

The west elevation is similar to the east in that it contains similar fenestration at the first and second floors underneath a stepped parapet roof (photo 4). The foundation is partially exposed towards the north and a basement access hatch is set at the ground level. The first floor contains a series of sixteen openings, two of which are slightly larger, boarded, and may correspond to additional entrances (photo 4). Three of the windows are boarded while the remainder has replacement, double-hung windows. The second floor has ten similar windows and none are boarded (photo 4). The roof parapet steps up to the south.

#### Interior

The interior is accessed via the original building address facing the railroad. Through a newer entrance with sidelights (photo 5) an entry hall leads to a stair to the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor and a long hall to access units (photo 6). Original hotel rooms have been converted to apartments (photo 7)—many enlarged from 2 hotel rooms into one apartment. Floors are vinyl and walls are both plaster and gypsum wall board. The long circulation corridor leads to the north of the building where a second stair also leads upstairs (photo 8). A similar long hall is flanked by multiple apartments on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor (photo 9). Units are also similar to those on the first floor (photos 10-11). (Figure 1 on page 3 illustrates the floor plan).



#### Integrity

Although all of the windows are replacements, new windows respect the original openings and depths and fenestration patterns are clearly evident; few bays are boarded with removable materials. All of the brick from both the original 1915 building and the 1926 addition are intact as are exterior porches and balconies over brick piers. The original and historic footprints are intact as are the rooflines and pitches. The building retains its early signage "Hotel Cuba." Despite interior alterations of new materials covering floors and some interior demolition within rooms beyond circulation halls to expand small hotel rooms into apartments, the original feeling of the hotel is evident. The building has sufficient integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Summary

The Hotel Cuba located at 600 East Main Street in Cuba, Crawford County, Missouri, is eligible for local listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) under Criterion A in COMMERCE. Completed in 1915 as the Palace Hotel, it was constructed to initially serve railroad travelers. Upon the designation of State Highway 14 through Cuba in 1926 as Route 66, the building was modified with an addition at the north elevation to attract the new motorists. After this period the building served both the railroad and automobile clientele. The period of significance begins with the construction date of 1915 and it extends to 1926 when the second and final addition was completed. Additional significance in conjunction with Route 66 continues through the arbitrary 50year cut-off in 1964 for National Register significance but for purposes of this listing it has been shortened. After the 1960s, the building continued to serve as a hotel for another decade and was later converted to apartments. The building retains integrity and meets the registration requirements set forth in the multiple property documentation form entitled "Historic and Architectural Resources of the City of Cuba, Missouri, 1821-1963" and the associated property types "III-A Commercial Buildings" in addition to subtype "III-C: Roadside Architecture." The building spans two historic contexts including "Railroads and Industry, 1866-1926" and "Route 66 and the Great Depression, 1926-1945."

#### Background - Founding of Cuba, Missouri and the Coming of the Railroad

Crawford County, Missouri was organized in 1829 and by 1837, the area that later became Cuba was first settled. Two decades later when the town was being surveyed for a proposed railroad line two local families consisting of Robert P. and Mary E. Jamison and C. Wesley and Mary Smith filed an official plat for "Cuba City." As plated, Cuba was comprised of thirty-two blocks divided in half by the proposed railroad line; North Main and South Main fronted the tracks. Street names were different running north and south and changed identity once crossing the tracks. As designed, the new town was a typical railroad town with business facing the tracks and residential was separated. This would change again with the advent of the automobile.

By 1859, the Southwest Branch of the Pacific Railroad was completed through Cuba and by 1861 it had extended to Rolla; the railroad also divided Cuba into two unofficial

communities, North Cuba and South Cuba.<sup>2</sup> The majority of businesses located to the north of the tracks but development of the town was slow. On May 12, 1877, Cuba was incorporated as a village and within four years its population numbered almost 400.<sup>3</sup> Besides the growing population, there was also a rising trend of individuals riding the railroad to points beyond Cuba; final destinations often were interrupted by a stay in Cuba to catch a second train. To meet the need, a series of hotels began to spring up adjacent the railroad.

#### Elaboration - Hotels as Successful Ventures

Hotels in Cuba first appeared on the local scene as a result of the railroad and increased visitors; one such, the McClay House stood across from the depot and was two-stories in height with fifteen rooms.<sup>4</sup> Other hotels sprang up in 1872 with the American Hotel (north side of South Smith), circa 1875 with the first Cuba Hotel (North Main between Meramec and Wall), in 1897 with the Hotel Grand near the tracks, in 1906 with the Hotel Dowley, in 1922 with the Hotel Central (West Washington), and several others through 1938.





Figure 3: Sanborn Fire Insurance Map, 1914. Shows earlier buildings on site demolished.

Between 1915 and 1922, six new hotels were built or renovated in Cuba and a number of restaurants, shops and bars sprang up to exploit the influx of visitors. The subject building began its life first as the Palace Hotel in 1915 and was constructed to serve railroad travelers (Figure 2). Replacing earlier structures on the city block (Figure 3), the new hotel was larger and more modern (Figure 4) and its future seemed bright. However, its business boomed for just a decade due to decreased railroad passenger trains. Also, due in part to poor roads, the hotel boom in Cuba was short lived. The Palace Hotel and several other local hotels began to close as a result.

Under the Federal Highway Interstate Highway System Act in 1926, State Highway 14, which ran through Cuba along Washington Avenue (the north boundary of the subject hotel), was designated Route 66. Although Route 66 did not immediately usurp the railroad's role as transporter of goods and passengers, the effect of the new highway was dramatic and eventually decisive.<sup>7</sup> It was this change which prompted the

**Figure 2**: Original City Plat. General site of Hotel Cuba is circled to the right. Source: Cuba Historical Society.





which ran through Cuba was designated Route 66; this change marked the beginning of the shift of businesses from the Main Street and railroad area to the suddenly significant new corridor. As a response, the authors conclude that the nominated building was "probably the most obvious example of the commercial response to the new highway." A look at the physical design of the hotel clearly illustrates the duel entrance aspect with an intentional focus on the Route 66 elevation. The nominated building thus represents two contexts. The Route 66 survey prepared by Becky Snider and Deb Sheals in 2003 verifies that the Hotel Cuba was in fact representative of the change in attention from railroad to automobile travelers.

#### The MPDF and Associated Historic Context

Based upon the historic timelines as illustrated in the MPDF, the Hotel Cuba was constructed during the period "Railroads and Industry, 1866-1926." Built in 1915, it served a major role in providing boarding for travelers coming via rail to and through Cuba. Erected on Main Street across the railroad tracks and adjacent the train depot, the nominated building known originally as the Palace Hotel contributed to the commercial and social environment of Cuba during this phase in local history which centered around the railroad. Competition to attract travelers resulted in many local hotels losing business once the railroad began to carry fewer passengers; new competition with the automobile was a challenge that was immediately addressed by the Hotel Cuba. Seeing the new transportation possibility as an asset, the owners of the hotel answered the call by constructing a new addition in association with Route 66.

Additional association with the context "Route 66 and the Great Depression, 1926-1945" was achieved when the owner's added this second entrance at Route 66. 12 Creating a new entrance lobby facing the highway, the owners also added new signage and a parking lot for automobiles. The Hotel Cuba as it was renamed, served a dual purpose supporting both modes of transportation. The building soon became one of the official stops along Route 66 (Figure 5) and business boomed for the next few decades.

The property is a good representative example of the "Property Type III-A: Commercial Buildings" as well as having a contribution to type "III-C: Roadside Architecture" as described in the MPDF. 13 Demonstrative of the property types, this building was erected as a railroad hotel in 1915 and then later adapted to automobile travelers in conjunction with Route 66 in 1926. The building also represents the only extant hotel in Cuba which illustrates both connections. 14 The role of the Hotel Cuba within the growth of the social life of Cuba and its direct connection to the commercial history of the town are clearly representative in the building which stands today. In meeting the registration requirements as set forth in the MPDF, the nominated building is a representative example of the property type as it was designed and constructed specifically to function as a commercial building in downtown Cuba; additionally it was an important component of the business growth of Cuba as it catered to railroad travelers coming to and through Cuba and stopping to shop in its downtown stores. 15

Definitely not the work of a formally-trained architect, this two-story structure has the indicative flat roof with parapet that many other local commercial buildings bear.

The Hotel Cuba is further significant under Criterion A in commerce because it is a good example of a specific property type (hotel) and it played a direct role in the story of the commercial and industrial development in Cuba. The building clearly reflects the economic forces that contributed to the development of Cuba and has additional significance as it was adapted to address the historic transportation artery Route 66.<sup>16</sup>

The building retains integrity of location, design, setting, workmanship, feeling and association. Despite replacement windows and some modifications within interior units of the building, original materials such as the brick are intact. From visual inspection, the only exterior modifications appear to be the installation of new replacement windows and some boarded bays. The interior has been slightly modified to house apartments but the long circulation corridors separating the east and west unit sides remain intact. The MPDF explains that changes to the interior are not typically significant due to the nature of the building.

To be listed individually in the National Register in accordance with the MPDF, the Hotel Cuba represents the characteristics and qualities of commercial growth in respect to both aforementioned historic contexts. The building further retains its original and early design and form, massing, and rhythm (despite infilled window openings), the original door and window fenestration, original exterior materials, and lastly has an obvious physical character representative of its time. The building clearly reflects its period of significance from 1915 to 1926 in that it retains both the original Railroad façade and the later Route 66 facade. Perhaps more importantly, the building exterior has not changed since adapted to Route 66 traffic (despite infilled window openings); no new additions have been constructed. Essential to the development of the building in context of both the Railroad and Route 66, it retains both entrances reflective of the building's evolution.

The building retains integrity and meets the registration requirements set forth in the multiple property documentation form entitled "Historic and Architectural Resources of the City of Cuba, Missouri, 1821-1963" and the associated property types "III-A Commercial Buildings" in addition to subtype "III-C: Roadside Architecture" as an intact example of a commercial hotel which succeeded in Cuba in part to its ability to adapt to changing modes of transportation as the city grew from a railroad town into one accessed by automobiles. The building thus also spans two historic contexts including "Railroads and Industry, 1866-1926" and "Route 66 and the Great Depression, 1926-1945" as described in the MPDF and has a direct association with the commercial growth of Cuba during its historic development.




