

JANE ADDAMS'S HULL HOUSE -- In 1889 Miss Addams, a pioneer social worker, opened this settlement house in what was then one of the worst slums of Chicago, inhabited by white and Negro Americans and immigrants from many lands. It brought thousands a new way of life through education, cultural opportunities, job training and general social reform.
