DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

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The tower is constructed of curved red brick and mortar having 3 foot thick walls. The internal spiral stairway utilizes granite steps which are built into the exterior wall and an internal center column of brick which is 1.5 feet in diameter. The height of the tower is 81 feet and has a base diameter of 16 feet. The diameter of the tower at the 55 foot level is 12 feet. The upper or observation section is 15 feet in diameter having a 2.5 foot wide platform. Access to the observation level is provided by an 8 foot steel bar ladder. The roof is dome shaped copper material providing weather protection.

The spiral stairway descends 10 feet below ground level and the tower is supported by a 10 foot thick concrete foundation. A ground level entrance had been sealed to restrict the public from using the tower. Four openings (each 2.5 feet x 4 feet) in the exterior wall allow passage of light. The observation level has two openings.

On March 2, 1829 another \$7,500 was appropriated. \$10,500 was expended in 1830. This site may have been on or near the exact landing of Jean Ribault in 1565.

As the St. Johns River, at this time, came down to the ocean it fanned out into many inlets. There were no jetties at this time to keep the Channel in the same place. Due to Northeasters and other strong winds the Channel was forever changing. These conditions lead to the conclusion that the first lighthouse was built too close to the waters edge and consequently undermined. No records available.

On June 30, 1834 Congress appropriated \$10,500 to rebuild the lighthouse; another \$10,000 on August 31, 1852 to try to make the lighthouse more secure. Shifting sands and erosion was taking its toll, causing the lighthouse and property to depreciate rapidly.

In 1853 site of the lighthouse was in danger of being entirely destroyed. Ships were complaining as to the effectiveness of the light. Sand dunes had shifted and keepers house was almost covered. The light was behind the sand dunes and could not be seen when ships got close to the beach.

As a result of these findings, Congress appropriated \$15,000 on August 3, 1854 for erection of a light and beacon light to serve as a range for the channel. They were located across the bar from the existing lighthouse. This led to the construction of the present lighthouse, completed January 1, 1859.

Nothing appears in the Coast Guard records until June 30, 1864 during the War Between the States. The lighthouse was used to mark the changeable and narrow channel for Yankee gumboats. Light was extinguished in 1867 by Rebels. Extensive repairs were needed (new lens and lantern). This report certifies story of old timers who credit John Daniels, caretaker before the War, with defying Yankee gumboats by shooting out the light in the tower. Lanterns were used after the War until the light was repaired.

Light was raised in 1887, fifteen feet to present height; was almost lost in 1889 when recommended 1st order Lighthouse be built on Fort George Island. Congress never acted on recommendation. In 1912 light candle watt increased 15x.

Lighthouse was abandoned January 15, 1929, replaced by St. Johns Lightship which was anchored about eight miles off shore, manned by Coast Guard, to guide shipping into mouth of St. Johns River.

Block 8. Statement of Significance cont.

The present lighthouse structure conformed to the shape and style as was recommended by the International Marine Conference of 1889. The solid red brick structure aided daylight navigation and a lens-light system was used during periods of darkness.

The brickwork is a common header bond type with a running bond course every fourth row. The brick joints have flush cement mortar.
