## 7. Description

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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Mahoney House is a square, detached residential building set in its own landscaped grounds just north of the central business district of Tonkawa. The two-story house with cross hipped roof decorated with small attenuated rafters is constructed of brick laid in the running bond. Smooth ashlar molds are used to surround some of the doors and windows. There are three chimneys, an end wall chimney on the north side of the building and two interior chimneys built like small bell towers with red tile on top.

On the front or west side of the house, there is a covered arcaded porch with 3 sets of double arches and a single arch at each end. The double arches are separated by columns with ornate low relief carvings and 2' metal railings are found between the columns of each arch. The main entrance of the porch has gabled roof and decorative molding at the crown of the arch. Five steps lead up to the porch to the front door which has window lights either side. There are 3 sets of sash-type windows with 8/8 lights. On the second story two balconies are separated by one of the cross sections of the building. Surrounding both balconies are 3 sash-type Palladian windows with 7/6 lights. The central section has a row of 3 windows in the same style.

The north side of the house is dominated by a porte cochere or carriage porch with elliptical brick embattlements. Above each of the three entrance arches there are ornate moldings. The corners of the porte cochere have brick pilasters topped with concave red tiles. Inside, the door has glass panels set in a wooden frame. Two Palladian windows with decorative arches flank the door. To the left of the porte cochere are 3 separate windows; one arched Palladian window; a smaller rectangular window with brick sill and lintel and wooden grille, and a larger 1/1 sash window with 6/6 lights. On the right, below the balcony, is a large 1/1 sash window with leaded diamond-shaped window lights and decorative molding above. The second story follows the same pattern, except above the porte cochere where 3 arched Palladian windows are placed in sequence.

At the rear or east side of the house there is a wooden-framed door flanked by two rectangular wooden framed windows with 6/2 lights. The north part has a small window with ornate wooden grille and a double arched Palladian window with 7/6 lights. Below this window is a metal grilled air vent. The second story has 3 sets of double arch Palladian windows also with 7/6 lights.

The south side of the house has a small arcaded porch with decorative ashlar pilasters. Above the porch are 3 arched windows in the usual style. Either side of the porch are 3 decorative arch windows in the Palladian style.

To the east of the house in the grounds is a rectangular, detached double garage. The garage has a gabled roof with smaller intersecting gables above the doors. Constructed with the same materials as the house, the garage had two doors which now have wooden sidings with a door, I sash type window and a double fixed single pane window. On the north and south sides is a 1/1 sash window with 6/6 lights. Both windows have brick arches above.

The only alteration is replacement of the red tile roof with composition shingles, however, this does not detract from overall character and fabric of the dwelling which has stood intact for over 55 years.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Mahoney House is significant because it represents one of the best examples of Mediterrean or Italiante style in this region of the state.

Built in 1928 at an estimated cost of \$100,000, the Mahoney House reflects the wealth that the original owner had attained from oil royalties derived from the Three Sands oil field near Tonkawa. Featured thoughout the struture are the elements of the style. These include the multiplicity of arched decorative windows, arcaded porch and openings and porte cochere. The bracketed eaves and low pitched roof, balconies with railing and large tiled chimneys are also typical of the style.

The main and basic elements of the style are still intact and the fine decorative appointments such as the carved keystones and pilasters, both of stone show the intent desire of the builder to create a building of uniqueness and quality.

The Mahoney house has remained intact and illustrates the magnificence use of early oil money in the construction of quality residential structures that was sought as a demarkation of that wealth.
