#### **Summary Paragraph**

The Gulf Coast presented unique challenges for life-saving with hurricanes and floods that made guardsmen "especially vulnerable to the forces of nature" in exposed locations. After the loss of the Galveston station in 1900 and the deaths of six guardsmen, their wives, and children in the 1916 hurricane, the new Gulf Coast architectural style stations became common with Station Number Seventy-nine (79) at Grand Isle as the first example of this new style. Completed and dedicated in 1919, the Station, Boathouse, and Cistern have survived nearly one-hundred years of annual tropical storms, hurricanes, and flood events. The property contains three non-contributing resources – two portable storage units and a radio tower. The station, boathouse, and cistern retain a high degree of integrity of materials, design, craftsmanship, location, setting, feeling, and association. They would all be recognizable to anyone who has visited or lived on Grand Isle for over 100 years.

### **Narrative Description**

Originally commissioned as Barataria Bay Station 214, the Grand Isle station constructed in 1918 drew heavily from the designs of Florida houses of refuge and included barracks for guardsmen and rescued mariners with adequate storage for food, water, clothing, and medicine.<sup>3</sup> Elevated approximately fourteen feet above surrounding grade on steel reinforced concrete piers, the station "allowed water from floods and hurricanes to pass safely under the station".<sup>4</sup> The building included surrounding porches (galleries) that helped to catch sea breezes and cool the station in the hot, humid gulf climate. The steeply pitched gable-style roof, dormer windows, rooftop watchtower, wood clapboard siding, and peripteral gallery gave the station the appearance of a southern bungalow perched in the treetops.<sup>5</sup> Designed between 1903 and 1923 by Victor Mendleheff, Life-

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Saving Service Architect, Gulf-Type Stations consisted of one-story buildings "surrounded by a verandah on all four sides" and elevated above the ground. The "gable-on-hip" roofs had a "hipped roof cupola with a lightning rod projected from the apex of the peak".<sup>6</sup>

The accompanying Boathouse comprised a rectangular wood-frame structure raised off the ground on concrete piers, wood lap siding, and gable roof.<sup>7</sup> It had ramps to give keepers a running start in hauling out the heavy equipment and wagons they pulled to the beach themselves for rescues.<sup>8</sup> The Cistern (water storage tank) served the guardsmen as the source of fresh water collected off the boathouse roof.

The site also contains two portable storage buildings and a radio tower (all non-contributing due to their non- historic age).

**Historic Integrity - Station:** The subsequent occupancy of the station as Grand Isle Town Hall allowed retention of the building's historical integrity. Primarily cosmetic changes and those required by storm damage through the years have only materially changed the original fabric of the building. The most significant loss is the watch tower originally located on the roof. Severely damaged by annual tropical storms, and allowing heavy rains and storm surges to flood the building, the rooftop structure was removed and the gable-hip metal roofing replaced. The communications equipment previously located in the tower has been replaced with the steel- frame tower next to the northeast corner of the station building.

Other exterior alterations include damaged ground level concrete piers that occurred when automobiles parked under the building were tossed by storm surges. Some piers have corners with exposed, rusted steel reinforcing. Aluminum handrails on the stairs from ground to first floor, window air conditioning units, and normal wear and tear complete the exterior changes.

On the interior, partition walls installed in the lobby, wood paneling, floor finishes, and paint comprise the majority of alterations. One original wall was apparently removed to make a larger office area for the mayor. As on the exterior, normal wear and tear exists on the interior.

**Historic Integrity – Boathouse and Cistern:** The accompanying Boathouse comprises a rectangular wood- frame structure raised off the ground on wood piers, wood lap siding, and gable roof. The ramps used to give keepers a running start in hauling out the heavy equipment wagons remain accessible via large hinged doors facing Ludwig Lane on the west and the station building on the north. The wood frame structure appears to remain essentially as it did originally though no photographs of the original building have been discovered to date. The large doors and ramps between floor level and street remain, though patched over the years. The building functions as the town maintenance department. The interior was not available for inspection. The Cistern remains

currently in use as the Grand Isle Town Hall. Station Grand Isle remains active on the east end of the island near Barataria Pass and the Grand Isle State Park with forty-one active duty personnel and four boats. 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essentially unchanged except that it no longer holds water and the gutter from the boathouse roof has been removed.

The other structures on the site do not intrude on the historic character of the site with the exception of the radio tower. However, the tower is located behind the station building, as are both portable buildings, and therefore is minimized from street view.

**Period of Significance (justification)**: The period of significance under criterion A is 1918-1968, encompassing the years the buildings on the property were constructed through the 50 year cutoff. The period of significance under criterion C is 1918, the year the buildings were constructed.

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**Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph** (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

Constructed in 1918, the United States Coast Guard Station #79, which consists of three contributing resources – the station, a boathouse, and a cistern - is significant on the local level under Criterion C: Architecture as a prime example of the Louisiana Coastal Vernacular style and as a prime example of Victor Mendleheff's life saving stations. Mendleheff designed all of the life-saving stations for the United States Life Saving Service (the precursor to the US Coast Guard) between 1903-1923. The Station is also eligible under Criterion A for the role it played in defending Louisiana's Gulf Coast and protecting and saving local residents and visitors to Grand Isle for 100 years. The Station has direct associations with the historic context Hurricane to Highway (1893-1931) as defined in the "Louisiana Coastal Vernacular: Grand Isle, 1780-1968" Multiple Property Submission. It meets the registration requirements of the Building and Structure Property Type found in Section F of the MPS. The period of significance under C is 1918, the year it was constructed; and under A, 1918-1968, the years it functioned as an active Coast Guard station.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

As see on pages 18-20 of the Louisiana Coastal Vernacular: Grand Isle, 1780-1968 Multiple Property Submission, the US Coast Guard Station #79 was begun in 1918. The fist life-saving station was set up in Grand Isle for the ninth district (of 13 total) representing the Gulf Coast. The building and its associated contributing boat shed and cistern falls under the building property type as defined in the Louisiana Coastal Vernacular: Grand Isle, 1780-1968 multiple property submission. Built in three sections in 1918, the buildings and cistern fall under the discussion of the Bungalow building type that were found on the island. These often also had prominent gable roofs, overhanging eaves, large gabled porches, large windows, beamed ceilings, and casual, hall-less floor plans. The USCG Station has all of these features. It also retains many interior features including paneled wooden doors, original office spaces opening onto the porches, and second floor barracks space. The only alterations have been for flooring and some wall materials.

The USCG Station #79 is elevated above high tides where it has been able to withstand the strongest storms and has proved significant for building construction that followed it on the island. The previously established vernacular of wood frame, porches, and steeply pitched roofs remained but became elevated a full floor or more above the ground and created outdoor living and storage areas at grade.

The registration requirements for the MPS state,

"Buildings of French Creole and Bungalow styles must retain major elements of these styles as described above for eligibility under Criterion C. Status of elevation to meet Base Flood Elevation requirements should not completely disqualify buildings on Grand Isle if they meet a majority of other elements of the specified style, mainly because of the geographic location of these buildings on an island continually battered by flooding and hurricanes and because of the longstanding history of elevating buildings on Grand Isle. Applicants should show documentation of historical background relative to the community for those structures not meeting Criterion C for architecture to achieve Criterion A or B listing under community

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significance. Buildings should at least retain integrity of design, feeling, association, location, and setting. Materials may have changed some due to repairing storm damage, but overall, the building should retain its overall form, style, and layout."

The USCG Station #79 meets the requirements under Criterion C as it retains the major elements that have been mentioned in the building property type description. Furthermore, it retains integrity of design, feeling, association, location, and setting. It also retains integrity of materials, miraculously even after weathering all of the storms it has seen over the last 130 years. Its overall form, style, and layout it most certainly intact and thus, the building is eligible for listing on the National Register as a prime example of the Louisiana Coastal Vernacular of Grand Isle.






## United States Coast Guard Station #79 Jefferson Parish, LA Photo Key - First Floor


