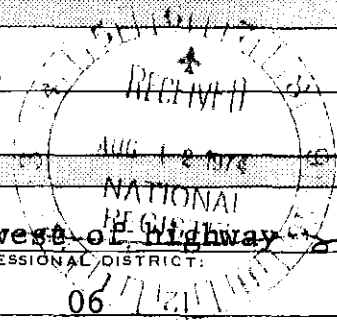

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This early nineteenth-century two-winged structure of one and one-half stories illustrates the charm of the Georgian-Federal period in Kentucky.

The house is of Flemish-bond brick construction, four bays in width with two central doors leading to the main rooms of the house. There are two additional rooms across the front to either side of the main rooms which were built at the same time as the main block. Both contain closeted stairways in the corners.

Woodwork is of the early, plain molded type. The mantels have deep grooves and are typical in the area of the first decade of the nineteenth century.

The ell (now restored) may predate the front masses and contains a large stone cooking chimney. The ell has six panel-and-batten doors which are also found throughout the house.

Originally all the windows had six-over-six and nine-over-six pane sash changed in recent years. Also altered is the loft in the upper story which has been finished. The portico, too, is an addition, probably dating to the turn of the twentieth century.

Otherwise, the appearance of the house is much as it was when the structure was built.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

John Wycliffe Bradley, born in 1786, built his brick house on Cane Run Creek probably shortly after his 1805 marriage to Sallie Suggett, daughter of John and Milly Davis Suggett. Both Bradley and his wife were children of Scott County's first pioneers.

John and Sallie Bradley were parents of six sons and two daughters. Of these the best known was Benjamin Franklin Bradley (1825-1897). He first became known for services rendered during the war with Mexico. In 1847 he and John Rodes Smith raised a company of soldiers composed of men from Scott and Bourbon Counties. It became Company A of the Third Regiment of Kentucky Volunteer Infantry, of which Bradley was eventually named Adjutant-General.

After the war Bradley returned to Georgetown and began the practice of law. He moved to Chicago in 1845 but returned to Kentucky in 1861 with the beginning of the Civil War.

Again Bradley aided in organizing troops, this time at Prestonsburg where he became Adjutant-General of the brigade. Later he was elected commanding officer of the First Battalion of Kentucky Mounted Riflemen. The popular commander became ill during the winter in the West Virginia mountains, however, and was forced to give up his command. Although no longer physically able to fight, Bradley was nominated by his men to represent Kentucky in the Confederate Congress and was elected to the Second Confederate Congress which met from May 2, 1864 to January 4, 1865.

Following the close of the Civil War, Bradley was elected clerk of the Scott County Circuit Court and served two terms. In 1889 he was elected to the Kentucky Senate and was made chairman of the Committee on Railroads. Apparently Bradley was a popular public servant with a career free of controversy.

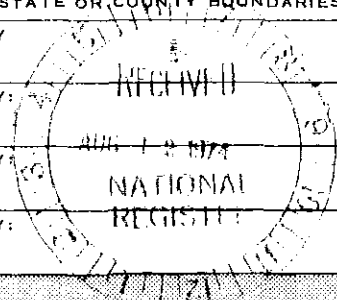
