Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Hotel Earlington is a two-story brick Italianate building constructed ca. 1880 in an asymmetrical plan. The house is located on an urban lot in the community of Earlington. The main facade is oriented towards E. Main Street and a cast iron fence is located at the sidewalk level.

On the main (west) facade is a one-story porch added ca. 1940 with tapered box posts and a wrought iron railing. The original second story porch has been enclosed with metal siding and one-over-one sash windows. The main entrance has original double doors of frame and glass and original screen doors. Above the doors is a segmental arched two-light transom. Windows are both rectangular and segmental arched one-over-one sash with the arched windows displaying brick relief arching and inscribed stone keystones.

The house has a gable roof of original slate shingles, a brick foundation, interior end brick chimneys and decorative eave brackets. On the north facade are two two-story flat-roofed polygonal projecting bays featuring small stained glass windows in the central facade. At the rear of the house is an original two-story frame porch which was enclosed ca. 1930 and now displays metal siding. There is also a small brick wing which contains the basement door.

The interior of the building retains original Italianate design mantles, four panel doors and the original staircase with an elaborate milled newel post and balusters. In front of the house is an original cast iron dart fence which is a contributing structure. In the rear is a ca. 1920 frame shed which is contributing to the site.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Hotel Earlington is significant for its association as a hotel during the growth and development of the coal town of Earlington in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The building is the only relatively unaltered hotel of the late 19th century in Hopkins County. Although the porch has been altered the building retains its original form and design as well as interior detailing.

The building was originally constructed as a residence for Thomas McEuen who was a stockholder of the St. Bernard Mining Company. As Earlington developed in the 1870s and early 1880s, McEuen had this two-story Italianate design residence built on Main Street. The building was completed around 1880 and it remained McEuen's residence until his death in 1885. By the early 1890s the building was used both as residence by McEuen's widow and as a hotel to serve visitors to the city.

Known as the Hotel Earlington, the building was mentioned in accounts of the period and is listed on the 1898 map of the city. The hotel was the largest in th community and it remained the most popular hotel during the early 20th century. In 1914 Mrs. McEuen died and hotel was purchased by the St. Bernard Mining Company who ran it until 1924. The Hotel Earlington continued to operate through the 1930s but by then the decline of the railroad traffic through the community resulted in fewer visitors and guests. In 1945, the hotel was renamed the Guest House and operated as a boarding house for several decades.

The Hotel Earlington is one of the few remaining structures associated with the early commerce of the town and it is the only relatively unaltered 19th century hotel standing in the county. Porch changes on the main facade render it ineligible under criterion C.


