Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Lancaster Downtown Historic District is located along portions of a three block section of South Main Street in downtown Lancaster, South Carolina. The district includes eleven commercial buildings and one governmental building, constructed between ca. 1880 and ca. 1935. The district retains integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. Architectural descriptions of the key buildings follow. Additional information on the contributing properties is available in the South Carolina Inventory of Historic Places files.

Key buildings which define the character of the district: (numbers on fronts of photos correspond to numbers here)

- United States Post Office, 301 South Main Street, ca. 1927: Two-story, blond brick building; five-bay facade with single-bay end pavilions flanking a three-bay Tuscan arcade; full Tuscan entablature; arches in arcade have wood-frame casement windows; central arch has a centered entrance with new glass door; ca. 1960 addition to rear; interior largely intact.
- 3. Springs Block, South Main Street, ca. 1905: Two-story, brick commercial block with three main sections; facade features classical details including round-arched windows, keystones, and denticulated cornices; **southern** section has three relatively unaltered storefronts.
- 8. Farmers' Bank and Trust Company Building, South Main Street, ca. 1920: Two-story, limestone-faced brick; Ionic portico <u>in antis</u>; unfluted Scamozzi columns with rusticated pier responds; full pedimented entablature; central entrance beneath portico; modern secondary entrance to right of portico.
- 10. Bank of Lancaster/Opera House, South Main Street at Gay Street, ca. 1907: Two-story, brick building; first story doors and windows have four semicircular arches with blond brick voussoirs, red brick keystones; corbeled brick cornice between first and second stories; windows on second story have segmental arched blond brick lintels; Flemish ogee gable centered in parapet; corner quoins with contrasting blond and red brick.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lancaster Downtown Historic District is located along portions of South Main Street, Catawba Street, and Gay Street in Lancaster, South Carolina. The district consists of twelve buildings constructed between ca. 1880 and ca. 1935 and includes commercial buildings and a post office. The district is significant as the most intact section of Lancaster's early commercial area. In addition, several of the properties are fine examples of commercial architecture.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

As early as 1799, a Lancaster County Courthouse was located on the present lot, and it is likely that commercial buildings as well as residences were located in the immediate vicinity. By the 1880s a number of commercial properties had been constructed in the block of Main just south of the courthouse. Commercial development had begun to occur in the next block as well, most notably a large, two-story, brick building at the southeast corner of Main and Gay Streets This building (#s 11, 12, 13) housed the Catawba House Hotel and retail space.

It was not until after 1900 that further commercial development occurred in the area of Main Street which comprises the district. In 1896 Col. Leroy Springs had established the Springs Cotton Mill in Lancaster. The mill created a market for Lancaster County's raw cotton and created jobs. Population increased from 1,094 in 1890 to 1,477 in 1900, possibly because of the mill. In 1905 Col. Springs constructed the imposing Springs Block (#3 and site of #2), which provided rental retail and office space and housed the Hotel Royal. In 1907 the First National Bank constructed a substantial building (#10) at the southwest corner of Main and Gay Streets, which also housed retail space and an opera house. In 1908 the livery stable at the corner of Gay and Catawba Streets burned. It was replaced by a large brick livery stable (#15), home of the Gregory Hood Live Stock Company. About 1910 the two-story, brick building at the northwest corner of Main and Gay Streets (#14) was constructed as a drug store. By this time the population of the town had grown to 2,098.³

By 1916, the Lancaster News was headquartered in a portion of the livery stable building and the Catawba House Hotel had been converted to office space. The 1920s saw further conversion of this section of the downtown from residential to commercial use. The Farmer's Bank and Trust Company (#8) and the store at 204 South Main Street (#9) were constructed during this time as was the building at 220-228 South Main Street (#4). The one-story section of that building was originally used as 'a movie theater. During this time the livery stable building on Gay Street housed a Coca Cola Bottling Plant, an ice cream manufacturer, and a Chevrolet dealership.

It is believed that the present facade of 201 South Main Street (#13) was applied during this same period, possibly when the building was converted for use as a bank. The post office moved to its new building (#1) in 1928 from its location in the Springs Block. In the 1930s Clevenger College, a secretarial school, operated for a short time in the building at 201 South Main. About 1935 the Hyatt Theater (#5) was constructed. Construction of two buildings in the 1940s completed the area's conversion to commercial use.⁵

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<u>Architecture</u>: Several of the properties in the Lancaster Downtown Historic District are particularly outstanding architecturally in Lancaster. The 1905 Springs Block (#3) is a large, brick building with classical elements. The Farmer's Bank and Trust Company Building (#8) features a finely detailed limestone facade with an Ionic portico. The Bank of Lancaster (#10) is a very intact two-story, brick building with blond brick details and a Flemish ogee gable, and the United States Post Office (#1) is an impressive masonry building with a Tuscan arcade and entablature. Together these properties define the character of the historic district.
