SUMMARY

The Fort Braden School, built in 1926, is a basically rectangular, one-story, frame vernacular building, with a complex, gable-on-hipped roof, with six chimneys and covered with asphalt shingles. The hipped parts of the roof have exposed rafter tails. The exterior is of drop siding. Fenestration is regular, with single or double, 6/6, double hung sash windows, many with six-light transoms. Small additions are located at the east and west ends of the building. The foundation is stuccoed. There is also a 1920s pump house toward the rear of the campus.

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SETTING

The Fort Braden School (Photo 1) is a rural school, located on 4.25 acres on the south side of State Highway 20 (Jackson Bluff Road), eighteen miles west of Tallahassee, the county seat and state capital. The building is set 136 feet back from the highway, and is accessed by vehicles by a circular drive in front of the main entrance. A private residence is located to the east, and open farmland and forested areas lie to the west and south, and across the road to the north. The grounds have not been extensively paved. Large oak, pine, and magnolia trees and evergreen shrubs are located on the campus and near the building.

The rear of the school property presently contains two noncontributing portable buildings and one historic building, a small pump house (Photos 2 & 3). Basketball-tennis courts are located west of the building (Photo 4), and a playground and baseball diamond are located on the east side of the campus (Photo 5). The portable buildings and walkway will be removed.

DESCRIPTION

Exterior

The main (north) elevation (Photo 1) of the Fort Braden School is very symmetrical. The main entrance is inset in a slightly projecting, central, gable roofed bay, defined horizontally by corner boards. The entrance (Photo 6) is approached by five steps flanked by brick cheeks with cast concrete coping. Double doors with six lights in the upper half are flanked by matching side panels with six lights, and surmounted by a six-light transom. The entrance to the porch is accented by a molded surround with gable returns. Within the

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tympanum of the gable is a round arch, accented by scrolls at its base. The porch is flanked by paired, 6/6 double hung sash windows and a small, louvered, rectangular vent is centered above the porch (Photo 1).

The north elevation of the east and west wings mirror each other, with a single window, a corbelled exterior chimney, and three sets of double windows (Photo 1). A small, shed roofed addition with a small square window is located at each end of the building (Photos 6 & 7).

The <u>east and west elevations</u> (Photos 5 & 4) mirror each other, with side entrances to the shed roofed additions and main building, exterior chimneys, single windows, and three sets of double windows. A small, detached custodian's shed is located near the entrance on the east elevation.

The <u>south elevation</u> (Photo 8) has a central bay with single and double windows and two interior chimneys. A small, stooped entry, and a small, shed roofed storage area attached to the main block are located near the west end of the elevation (Photo 9). Slightly projecting wings with no fenestration flank the main block of the building.

Interior

The main entrance to the school opens into a small central hall (Photo 10). To the west are the principal's and school secretary's offices (Photo 11). To the east are a kitchen and small storage area (Photo 12). The entry hall leads to a central, east-west corridor (Photo 13) which accesses the other rooms of the building. At the south end of the entry hall is a central room that was originally an auditorium (Photos 14, 15, & 16) with a small stage at its west end. Four classrooms (Photos 17 & 18) with small cloakrooms (Photo 19) occupy the four corners of the building. Additions to the original 1926 building include girls' and boys' restrooms at the east and west ends of the building, respectively, and a small storage room on the rear elevation. It is accessed by an exterior entrance on its east elevation (Photos 15 & 19; See Floor Plan).

Most of the interior features and finishes are intact. Original wood floors remain, covered with carpet in the main corridor, auditorium, and classrooms. The walls are plaster on wood lath. A chair rail is found in the hallways (Photo 13).

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Ten-foot, tongue-and-groove ceilings with step and crown molding remain exposed in all but the principal's and secretary's offices (Photo 11). The restrooms are unaltered.

Natural ventilation and light were provided for the interior with the placement of numerous windows, including 6-light hopper windows in the corridor walls of the classrooms (Photos 13 & 17).

ALTERATIONS

The first major alteration to the school was the addition of modern restrooms at the east and west ends of the buildings (Photos 7 & 8). These were built in the early 1930s by the order of health officials to replace a latrine which was located toward the rear of the campus. The school has always had electricity. Before 1938, however, it was powered by a generator housed in a small building to the rear of the main building. The school was originally heated by wood burning stoves in each classroom and the auditorium. In 1940, the stoves were converted to fuel oil.

The exterior configuration of the Fort Braden School has changed little since the early 1930s. The original roof, probably asbestos, has been replaced with asphalt shingles. The exterior was sandblasted and repainted in the late 1980s.

Most of the other changes are minor alterations made in 1975. On the exterior, these include the enclosure and stuccoing of the foundation, which conceals heating and air conditioning and meets fire codes, and the addition of the small storage room on the rear of the main building (Photo 9).

On the interior, there have been changes in the uses of some of the rooms, but no major structural changes. The auditorium was converted into a library (Photo 15), and the stage was enclosed with plasterboard to create a teachers' workroom (Photo 20). The northeast classroom was converted into a lunchroom, the northwest classroom became a clinic/office, and the principal's office was remodelled with panelling and lowered ceilings (Photo 11). Carpeting, which covers the original wood floors in the classrooms and main corridor, was also installed in 1975.

The grounds were changed slightly with the construction of the basketball-tennis courts on the west side of the campus in 1955 (Photo 4). Modern portable buildings have been on the

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campus since 1975. Covered walkways (Photo 9) were built between the main building and the portables c1990.

In spite of these changes, the historic character and feeling of the school remain in its proportions, plan, and setting. The original ten foot, tongue-and-groove ceilings remain exposed except in the principal's office, and most of the original hardware, windows, and interior finishes remain in place.

SUMMARY

The Old Fort Braden Elementary School, built in 1926, is locally significant under **Criterion A** in the area of **Education** as the oldest rural school building in Leon County. It played a vital role in the education of children in western Leon County, particularly in the unincorporated community of Fort Braden, and is an example of the schools that were built in an effort to consolidate the numerous one-room school houses that once dotted the rural areas of the county.

HISTORIC CONTEXT

The Florida constitution of 1885 introduced the concept of the special school tax district, in effect laying the groundwork for the modern school system. This legislation granted citizens in these newly created special tax districts the authority to levy a three to five mill tax on property to support public schools in their tax district. Ironically, this liberal piece of legislation also reaffirmed the practice of separate schools for the races. Initially, Leon County had only two districts, Tallahassee and Miccosukee, but in the 1920s, four new districts were created: District 3, Chaires; District 5, Woodville; District 6, Moore; and District 8, Fort Braden.

The Fort Braden community traces its beginnings to the erection of a fort along the Ochlockonee River in 1839, during the Second Seminole War. Designed to protect settlers west of Tallahassee from Indians, the fort was abandoned at the conclusion of the war in 1842. The rural farming community which had grown up around the structure adopted the fort's name shortly thereafter.

School consolidation and transportation were vitally important to the creation of the Fort Braden School. Prior to consolidation, only single room schoolhouses dotted the western portion of the county, and the education offered at these small schools was inferior to that provided at the schools within the City of Tallahassee. With consolidation, rural students would attend larger, centrally located schools in their respective regions of the county. Attempts at consolidation at the turn of the century failed, however, primarily due to the lack of adequate road systems that were needed to transport students to these central locations.

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Only in the boomtime 1920s, with the advent of the motorized school bus and improved roadways, did the twenty year old dream of consolidation become a reality. Within the next twenty-five years, the number of white schools in Leon County decreased from thirty to eight. In 1923, the school board approved a \$150,000 bond issue to construct the elaborate Mediterranean Revival style Caroline Brevard Elementary School in Tallahassee (NR 1987). Building continued until 1941, with new buildings constructed for Fort Braden Elementary, 1926; Chaires Elementary, 1929; Sealy Memorial Elementary, 1929; Leon High, 1937 (NR 1993); Miccosukee Elementary, 1941; and Woodville Elementary, 1941.

HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE

In June 1926, the trustees of the newly formulated Special Tax District #8, in the western portion of the county, had requested the consolidation of all schools in the district, except for the Campbelle, Springhill, and Hale schools. The school board approved the motion to provide the district's white students with a new multi-room schoolhouse.

The site of the four classroom Fort Braden School could not be determined until the path of the new Jackson Bluff Road was decided. The east-west Jackson Bluff Road also provided the area's older students access to the county's only white high school, Leon High, located in Tallahassee, eighteen miles to the east.

For the sum of \$244.25, the school board employed local Tallahassee architect E. D. Fitchner to prepare the architectural plans for the school. Fifteen thousand dollars in time warrants were issued for construction of the Fort Braden School. Due to this limited appropriation, the construction bid process yielded only two bids: C. C. Brown Construction, \$16,764 and Parker and Yeager Construction, \$15,650. Construction began in September and reached completion shortly before Christmas, 1926.

Rural Fort Braden's frame vernacular building seems unsophisticated and frugal when compared to other elementary schools constructed in Leon County during the 1920s. For instance, the Caroline Brevard and Chaires elementary schools each cost ten times more than the \$15,000 allocated for Fort Braden. Such disparity can only be attributed to variations of wealth among the county's communities. The highly decorative Caroline Brevard school, in Tallahassee, and the brick Chaires

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school in eastern Leon County, were located in more affluent communities.

Although Fort Braden's entire building was not fully utilized until the 1927-28 school year, a single room within the building served nearby students in January of 1927 until the end of that term. I. G. Foraker was appointed as the school's first principal in 1927, and served in that position until his resignation in 1933.

Throughout the ensuing decades, the Fort Braden School served the area as an educational facility and a public meeting place. In 1991, because of Fort Braden Elementary's continued student growth, the Leon County School Board decided to construct a new Fort Braden school on State Road 20, one mile east of the present site. The old Fort Braden School is now vacant, but will probably continue to be used by the community. The remaining portable buildings and covered walkways will be removed.
