The Smeede Hotel is located in T. 17 S., R. 3 W., of the Willamette Meridian, Lane County, Oregon. It is situated in Lot 6 in Block 8 of Skinner's Donation to Lane County.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Smeede Hotel, constructed in 1884-1885, is the oldest surviving brick hotel in Lane County. Situated in downtown Eugene, near the City Park Blocks and the Lane County Court House, the Smeede Hotel has remained in continual usage since its erection. George H. Park, a local builder-contractor, who had built many homes and businesses in the Eugene area, supervised the construction of the hotel for Charles Baker, a local businessman. Work on the hotel began in July of 1884. An article in the Oregon State Journal, July 26, 1884, described the anticipated results. "Contract has been let to G.H. Park for the building of a three story brick hotel for C. Baker, on his lot adjoining the postoffice. The building will be 52 feet front and 65 feet deep and three stories high. The ground floor will contain dining room, 23 X 45; bar room, 20 X 23; commercial room, 22 X 25; and a store room for rent, 22 X 40; kitchen, 16 X 24; laundry, 10 X 13; pastry room 10 X 12. The partition between office and dining room will be constructed so as to be taken away, so the dining room can be made 23 X 65. The second floor will contain  $\boldsymbol{\circ}$ ladies parlor, 16 X 25, and 15 large bed rooms. The third floor will contain ш 16 large bedrooms. There will be no dark rooms. The rooms will be well m ventilated with a large transom over the door. The halls running through the building are all large. The stairs leading to the different floors are all wide and of easy ascent. The building will be all hard finished throughout Z and all the woodwork will be grained in imitation of various woods. The S building and furniture will cost about \$12,000." -

The hotel is rectangular in plan. Fenestration is regular with doublehung sash windows, two lights over two. The windows of the five-bay facade have round arch heads with radiating brick voussoirs and corbelled hoods. Those of the side elevations have elliptic brick arch heads. Brick flues projecting above the side walls are intact.

Charles Baker sold the hotel before its completion in March 1885 to Stephen Smeede for \$12,000. Smeede retained the name Baker's Hotel until 1892, when he revamped the exterior and changed the name to the Hotel Eugene. In 1895 he again altered the structure; this time changing the name to Hotel Smeede.

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Smeede's 1892 alterations were confined to the facade. He stuccoed the exterior and added cast iron corner pilasters and an elaborate metal cornice with a dentil course and bracketted pediment over the central bay.

Between 1895 and 1902 the building was extended to the rear or through The second and third stories of the side to the east side of the block. The ground floor facade has been modified elevations are still exposed. The dining rooms and lobby spaces of the ground story are unchanged, slightly. The second and third floor plans, including the ladies' parlor, are however. unchanged except that a 10 X 20 floor opening, which carried light from the roof skylight down two stories, has been sealed. Window trim, doors, and door frames, baseboards, and the rail and spindles of the open staircase are intact. During the early 1900s, a sheet metal canopy was suspended over the front The hotel's original name, Baker's Hotel, is still imbedded in entrance. bronze in the front sidewalk.

The hotel remained under Smeede family ownership until 1971, when the Eugene Renewal Agency purchased the property. The aim of the Renewal Agency is to develop properties within project boundaries which have become non-productive or could have a much greater productivity. The agency's plan for the Smeede Hotel is to retain the integrity of the exterior but to adapt the interior into office space.

Representing some of the best early Italianate commercial architecture in the upper Willamette Valley, the Smeede Hotel is the oldest surviving brick masonry hotel in Lane County. At the end of the nineteenth century Eugene's Willamette Street, on which the Smeede Hotel is situated, was a bustling commercial center which included the most sophisticated buildings in the county. Today, few of the old facades remain intact, and only the Smeede Hotel retains its historic face.

The Smeede Hotel is associated with the ultimate in social life and culture of an earlier day. The hotel catered to the upper-class visitors to Eugene and the wealthy local c itizen by providing ornate furnishings and facilities, exotic and expensive menus, and elaborate banquets. A 1902 banquet, which honored H.B. Miller, consul to Niu Chwang, China, featured on the menu Toke Points on half shell, Consommé with Cretons, Tenderloin Salmon Maitre D'Hotel,

Saratoga Chips, Fillets of Beef En Champignous, Potato Croquettes, Roman Punch, Roast Duck with Jelly, Petits Pois, Lobster En Mayonaise, English Plum Pudding, Hard and Brandy Sauce, Neapolitan Cake, Angel Cake, Pineapple Ice Cream, Assorted Fruits, Nuts, Edam Cheese, and Café Noir. One distinguished guest of the hotel was William Jennings Bryan, who stayed overnight while on his 1896 Presidential campaign swing through Oregon.

Many local businesses around the turn of the century gave the hotel as a geographic reference point for street location on their invoice statements, letterheads, and business cards. As the years progressed, the Smeede Hotel diminished in commercial productivity but remained a city landmark. As more of the early Willamette Street structures were removed, the hotel's historical significance to the local citizens increased. Today it is a valuable last link between the hey day of old Eugene City and the present.
