#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Huston House, a large Greek Revival style structure, is a timber frame building two-and-one-half stories high. A steeply pitched gable roof and brick end chimneys contribute to the vertical character of the house. The most imposing feature, however, is a massive two story portico which extends across the entire five bays of the west facade. This portico is formed out of a section of the gable roof rather than a separate structure and is supported in four columns.

Attached to the south side is a one-and-one-half story wing with a gable roof. The entire house is sheathed with clapboards except for the principal facade of both the main section and the wing, which have flash-board siding. Most of the windows consist of six-over-six double-hung sash. Exceptions are the tall French windows off the porch, and a late-nineteenth century dormer on the wing which has modern sash.

The Greek Revival ornament on the Huston House includes fluted columns in the Composite Order. The columns support an entablature with deeply recessed panels extending around the entire frieze. A cornice with dentils caps each window on the first story of the west facade. Enframing the main entrance are pilasters supporting an entablature which repeats the same denticulated motif. In addition, the architrave contains carved floral designs which are Italian Rennaissance in derivation. Original interior features include marble mantel pieces and heavy cornice moldings.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Huston House is an extremely fine and monumental example of a version of the Greek Revival style which is rare in Maine, i.e., a single gable structure with an impressive colonnaded porch running along the longitudinal axis.

In 1852, seven years after the great fire of Damariscotta, James Gilmore Huston (1808-1865) inherited his father's vast estate on the Damariscotta River. He was descended from James Huston (1690-1755), who settled in Bristol in 1729, fled from Indian attacks and returned, in 1747, to found a large family engaged over the succeeding five or six generations, in various rewarding enterprises. In 1853 Gilmore Huston moved his father's house (1794) one-hundred yards to the north of its foundation and erected on the site a house befitting his wealth and position within the community. He owned a hardware merchandizing and shipping business with offices and wharves in downtown Damariscotta. He operated a sawmill on Mill Brook, one mile east of the river, at the far end of his property. He cut ice there, on the millpond. He ran a brickyard on the shore of the river and a large orchard behind his house. He served as trustee of Lincoln Academy and died a rich man.

The house that Gilmore Huston built was designed by Peabody Simmons (1817-1894), a native of Union Maine, who studied architecture in Bangor. He carried on a building trade in Damariscotta for fifteen years following his education, and among structures to his credit are the First Methodist Church and the Joseph Day Block-Maine Hotel (1850). He moved to California in the mid-1850s where he built the Masonic Temple in San Francisco. He ended up in Somerville, Massachusetts, practising his skills until his death.
