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7. THE DELTA QUEEN (Revised description)

> The Delta Queen is a sternwheel steamboat 250 feet in length (285 feet including the 26-ton paddlewheel), 58 feet at the beam, and draws 7.6 feet of water. She weighs 1837 gross tons, and rises 62 feet above water level.

The vessel is driven by a paddlewheel connected by a pitman to two, 35-foot pistons of her cross-compound steam engine. She accommodates 190 passengers, is outfitted with both private cabins and public rooms resembling in appearance to a degree steam packets of the latter part of the last century. The boat is manned by a crew of 75. The boat's superstructure is of wood in good condition; the hull is steel.

The condition of the vessel is from good to excellent and is largely unchanged except with regard to furnishings since she was commissioned in 1926. The vessel remains in service the summer of 1970.

8. Statement of Significance (Revised)

The Delta Queen is the only operating vacation steamboat in the nation. The last of the steam sternwheelers to be assembled or constructed in the United States, the Queen is a functioning, colorful symbol of the era of steam and paddlewheels which form of transport was of paramount importance to the development of inland America in the last century.

The boat was designed and fabricated on the River Clyde, Scotland, in 1924, and was shipped piece-by-piece to Sacramento, California, where it was assembled and commissioned for use on the Sacramento River. In 1946 it was brought to the Ohio-Mississippi waterway where it has operated continuously for tourist excursions annually in season from Pittsburgh to New Orleans. At each river port which the Queen lands or passes, she is a recognized landmark. The tone of her steam whistle is recognizable and anticipated from downtown Pittsburgh to downtown New Orleans. The vessel has stimulated great interest among eleven states which border the Ohio-Mississippi rivers as a vacation and recreation area in a manner far exceeding her actual patronage.

The Queen is owned by the Greene Line Steamers, Inc., an Ohio company founded in 1890. The firm has operated 28 packet steamers on the waterway during its history and is the only such company in existence today. When not in use, the boat is moored at the Public Landing, Cincinnati, headquarters of the Greene Line.

The Queen is in jeopardy because her wooden superstructure fails to meet modern marine specifications for overnight-carrying passengers. Only an act of Congress will save the vessel for continued use as at present.

The <u>Delta Queen</u> is a fitting and appropriate last survivor of the age of steam, paddlewheel packets on the nation's riverways. In addition, the vessel is the last operating link between modern Diesel river towboats and the romantic days of steam packets when these ornate monsters dominated inland water travel and created legends never to be lost in the annals of the American past.
