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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

Constructed in 1912, the Sharp Lumberyard typifies the construction techniques and design of early twentieth century lumberyards. The two wooden clapboard structures with metal roofs and wooden pier foundations, serve as offices and storage facilities for the lumberyard.

The main building, on the northeast side of the corner lot is basically 100' x 60'. The rectangular, gabled, two story building is flanked on each side by one story shedroofed sections. On each side of the upper level of the central portion of the building are five pairs of fixed 2x4 lighted windows. Each end of the central section has an open drive through for access to the storage areas built into each side of the building with four levels of ladder-type framing. The exposed wood truss framing adds to the visual variety of the interior. Facing east onto Broadway the front part of the south side of the building serves as the offices with bronze framed display windows with a central recessed entry and a clearstory (now painted) above. The only alterations to the structure have been the redecoration of the office and the application of a brick veneer false front connecting the portions of the front facade but this has been painted to match the rest of the structure, minimizing its intrusion.

The other building (on the south side of the yard) is designed for storage of lumber and is a gabled, 40'x75' rectangular building with an open north side exposing the four tiered ladder-type framing for storage and the wood truss supports. Access for deliveries and pick-ups is available through the 50' yard between the two structures.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Sharp Lumberyard, constructed in 1912 as one of three in town, is the only remaining lumberyard that served the important function of supplying building materials for the new community, being constructed with the arrival of the railroad. The lumberyard buildings consist of two wood framed, clapboard structures which typify the simple, utilitarian style common to lumberyard in the early twentieth century, but are rarely seen today. Part of the C.E. Sharp chain of lumberyards began in Woodward, Oklahoma (in the county south of Harper county) in 1900. The outlet in Laverne remained until 1972 when the chain of stores was dissolved. The business in Laverne was sold to the Home Lumber and Supply Co., another area chain of lumberyards that had begun in Ashland, Kansas in 1905. This lumberyard is the oldest of two remaining in the county and one of the oldest remaining lumberyard establishments in northwestern Oklahoma.
