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## **SIGNIFICANCE**

The George and Susan Guiberson Armstrong house is an early example of a vernacular farm residence built of limestone. It is the only extant single cell house with entrance centered in the gable front. The most notable characteristic is the high state of preservation of this very small inexpensively constructed residence.

The 17 1/2' x 17 1/2' one story gabled house is constructed of locally quarried rubble limestone. The south public facade has a door centered in the gable. The east and west facades each have an under eave window. The north facade has no openings, but has an exterior beehive shaped stone chimney.

The main south facade is constructed of roughly squared quarry faced and rubble limestone laid in courses with random bond. Other facades are of uncoursed rubble. Joints are grapevine tooled, but not very carefully or regularly. Quoins and jambs are roughly squared quarry faced stone. Lintels and sills are of wood. The windows are not splayed. The interior reveals have wood lintels and sills and mortared sides. The sides have pieces of wood in them. These may have been decorative or may have had shutters attached. The door lintel is roughly squared quarry faced stone. There is no sill, since the door is flush with the ground. The door is recessed, and the reveal is paneled with undecroated wood. The overhanging eaves and verges are closed with mitred soffits and mitred boards against the stone.

The one room residence probably had a dirt floor and sleeping loft. Interior walls are coursed rubble with grapevine tooled joints. There is no woodwork except the lintels and sills. The fireplace has an arched opening. Grapevine tooling is used to make a ray-like design around the opening.

The design and quality of the stonework indicat that the house may have been built by the owner. However, even this inexpensively built residence evidence concern for aesthetics in the grapevine design around the fireplace and the detail around the window.

George Arcmstrong was born in Ireland in 1817 and married Susan Guiberson in 1984. They were early settlers who came to Madison County in 1853. In 1855 Armstrong obtained patent deed to the 40 acre farm on which his house is built. In 1875 he still owned only the 40 acres. This small size farm indicates that Armstrong was a probably much less affluent than the average farmer.
