

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building housed the first major bank in Florida. Built for William "Money" Williams circa 1830 by Benjamin Chaires. Its history is closely connected with that of the Columns.

The building probably occupies the site of two earlier banks. Their charters were purchased by the Union Bank which was created February 13, 1833, by the Territorial Council and formally opened on January 16, 1835, with John G. Gamble as President. It was capitalized at \$1,000,000 and became the territorial major bank. It was to benefit the planters instead of other commercial interests. Unsound banking practices, the Panic of 1837, and Indian wars lead to its closing in 1843.

The Freedman's Bank was housed here after the Civil War. It has been used as a church and for various businesses since closing as a bank in 1879.



- C. Technical Description of Interiors
 - 1. Floor plan: One floor. Interior space divided into two areas. Originally single space with flat round vault ceiling.
 - 2. Stairways: None
 - 3. Flooring: 4" wide pine boards
 - 4. Wall and ceiling finishes: Wall board and plaster on wood lath, flat plaster ceiling obscures vaulted space.
 - 5. Interior doorways and doors: None
 - 6. Trim: Interior shutters paneled to exterior, 2 1/2 folds per side, recessed into jambs. Window trim has heavy entablature, reeded pilasters, plinth blocks, and baseboard. Windows set in splayed openings.
 - 7. Hardware: "U" shaped metal holder for interior shutter bar. Tie rods with square washers extend through building
 - 8. Lighting: Electric
 - 9. Heating: Electric
- D. Site Description: Building faces east, alley and parking area south and west; "the Columns" c. 1835 and additions to north.

All efforts have failed to retain this most significant building on its original site. A campaign is now underway to secure, through public subscription, the funds necessary to move the structure to another site within the Tallahassee Historic District.

ESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Union Bank Building possesses certain very pronounced characteristics of the Federal style. Since the Federal style emerged from the Georgian (Late) and into the Greek Revival it reflects characteristics commonly associated with both. The Union Bank has a balanced facade rendered more severly classical through the use of stucco over brick. The effect of compact solidity is further heightened by hiding the roof behind a balustrade or parapet placed over the eaves. All of this is softened by the use of curved shapes, these taking the form of elliptical fanlights (blind niches here) over the doorway and flanking windows. Projecting from the front of the building was the small classical porch (removed during relocation) typical of the Federal style. The recessed doorway with framing pilasters and projecting entablature is more typical of the Classic Revival, as is the cornice at the roofline.

The Florida House Journal, 1841-42 revealed that the original contract for construction of the building specified exterior dimensions of 33 foot frontage and 51 foot depth, the same dimensions recorded by the Historic American Buildings The banking room, according to the same account, was to be 28 feet by 30 feet and the president's room 14 feet by 18岁 feet. The third room was to be a vault for books and papers. The rooms were to be floored with marble with granite for steps, sills and coping. Wall construction is brick bearing walls with scored rustication and painted joints. main entrance doorway in the north elevation has the original transom and frame remaining indicating the existence of double doors originally. The transom has three major lights with 12 surrounding lights. The doorway into the east elevation appears to have the original hewn surround, cypress doors and mortised and tenoned joints. Windows are double-hung sash, 12 over 12 lights on the north and east elevations and casement on the west elevation. The roof is flat.

Although the structure did suffer some minor damage and alteration during relocation, it is stable at the present time, and scheduled for complete restoration.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In 1821, when Florida became a U. S. territory, and for nearly ten years thereafter, it had no banks of its own. Business was transacted in hard money when possible, but relied to great extent on bank notes from outside the territory, and on script of well-known merchants. The readily apparent disadvantage of this system was that it drained any sort of money out of Florida, and drove prices up. to numerous petitions, the Florida Legislature sought to remedy this deficiency by creating a territorial bank, the Bank of Florida, in 1828. The act had to be passed over Governor DuVal's veto, because the governor felt that Florida development was being paralyzed by lack of funds, and he could not see how simply creating a bank to handle existing money would help. In 1829 the legislature repassed the charter of this same bank (again over DuVal's veto), and William Williams presided over the new institution until 1833. Not satisfied with one bank, the legislature granted a charter to the Central Bank of Florida in 1832. This bank was headed by Benjamin Chaires when it became operative in 1833, and it bought the Bank of Florida's charter in the same year. DuVal cared for neither of these institutions because they served primarily the merchants instead of the planters. was thought that if an institution were created that would float bonds nationally and internationally that money would pour into the Floridas to stimulate and expand the planter economy, benefitting the whole territory. Responding to DuVal's urging in 1833, the legislature chartered a planter's bank, the Union Bank, which opened for business in 1835 with John G. Gamble as president.

Lot 183, the original site of the Union Bank Building, was purchased by William "Money" Williams from the Tallahassee City Commission in 1829 while he was operating a private banking business, presumably from his two-story brick residence on Monroe Street. Before the middle of 1831, Williams had moved from his dwelling on Monroe Street to a new residence and banking house on Lot 183 at the southwest corner of Adams and Park Streets, the house now known as the Columns. Williams also owned Lot 184, immediately to the west and he sold both lots to the newly formed Central Bank of Florida for \$15,000 in 1833.

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Significance

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In 1838, the Union Bank bought the Central Bank's charter. In 1840, the Union Bank still occupied part of the Columns building. In 1841, "In compliance with the injunction of the Stockholders, the Board of Directors (of the Union Bank) have contracted for the building of a fire proof banking house, on the same lot with the present banking house (the Columns)." This quote taken from the Florida House Journal 1841-42 goes on to state interior dimensions, use of rooms, materials to be used, etc. The building was contracted to be completed by March 25, 1841. At this time Col. Williams was still on the Board of Directors and John G. Gamble still president. Ownership and control of the Union Bank changed hands several times and the period of 1869-1879 was the last during which the bank building played an historic part in Florida's financial history.

The Union Bank, which had occupied its original site (south portion of Lot 183 on the Old Plan of the City of Tallahassee) since its construction in 1841 had served a variety of uses in modern times, including a stationers office, a beauty shop, drapers and a bail-bond office, all between 1928 and 1972. In early 1972, the owners of the property, with another intended use planned, offered both the Union Bank and the Columns to the community at large if they would move it before a certain date. Otherwise, the building would be razed.

In an effort to save Florida's oldest banking establishment and one of the few Federal style buildings in the State, ownership of the Union Bank was transferred to the State of Florida and arrangements were made to relocate the building to its present site on the southeast corner of the Apalachee Parkway (Highway 27) and Calhoun Street. The building, as presently situated, occupies a prominent site one block east of Florida's Historic Capitol well within the capitol complex. It will, when restored, be utilized as government offices for the State of Florida.

Although the original site of both the Union Bank and the Columns was historically important, the decision was made that the buildings should be saved at any cost, including relocation, an action which is normally looked upon as a last resort by those officially responsible for preservation within the State. Not only was the move supported by officials at the State level, but by the general citizenry of Tallahassee. The bank had long served as a landmark and there was strong public sentiment in favor of saving the building--public sentiment being one of the greatest boons to historic preservation at the local level.

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Resubmission of the Union Bank nomination to the National Register of Historic Places is in no way an attempt to diminish the importance of the original site of the structure (now a paved parking lot) or to give additional importance to the new It is rather an attempt to give the appropriate recognition to a building which has been documented as one of the oldest and most historically significant buildings in Florida's capitol city. Moreover, as previously stated, it is one of the few surviving examples of the architecture of the Federal period to be seen in the State. If it is thought that 1841 is late for Federal style architecture, the objection loses validity when one reflects that Tallahassee had more the character of a small frontier town than that of a sophisticated Eastern city sensitive to the latest voque. Developers, coaxing a capital from the wilderness, built in accordance with city architecture as they had last seen it.

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
