Exterior.

The Peter Westervelt House was built in two sections. The main, or West, wing is a 1½ story brownstone structure with a gambrel roof. The front facade, facing South, has a later full length one story porch. The house has three bay and a side hall. The windows are 12/12 sash with paneled shutters. The windows and door have flat stone lintels. There are later dormers on the roof.

The East addition, built in 1810 when Peter Westervelt married Fransiney DeMott and moved into her fathers house (which Peter built). The addition also has a full length pertice across the South facade. The wing is a $2\frac{1}{2}$ story frame building covered with clapboard and has a gable roof. There are four bays and an offset center door. Even though the East wing is $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories it still does not rise as high as the $1\frac{1}{2}$ story gambrel roof section. The windows in the second floor of the East wing are 6/6 sash. The first floor windows are 12/12 sash and 8/8 sash, all with louvered shutters.

There has been a modern kitchen added onto the East end of the house.

On the grounds is an early 19th century Dutch style barn. Altered completely on the exterior, the frame and some of the interior remains intact. Presently used as a garage and storage building.

Interior.

Upon entering the 1808 section by the South facede, which is the front, one opens the front door onto a long side hall, 33 feet long and 11 feet wide. An interesting stairway, of Adamesque style, is at the far end of the hall. Opposite the stairway is a modern enclosed bathroom. There are two rooms to the left of the hall; the parlor and the library. The mantelpieces in these rooms are works of art, done in the contemporary Adamesque style of the late 18th, early 19th century. Also of note in these two rooms and the hall are the base boards, the ceiling cornices, and the door framing. The Farlor, the larger of the two rooms, is 18 feet by 18 feet while the Library is 16 feet 9 inches by 14 feet.

The East wing has three main rooms and two smaller store rooms. The Dining Room, 17 feet by 17 feet, has a fireplace and mantel, quite plain in comparison to the mantels in the earlier section. The East wing has been extensively altered.

There is a modern kitchen and playroom in the far East wing.

The character of the interior of the house has been somewhat jeopardized since the building has become a day-care center for the youngsters of Englewood. EE INSTRUCTION

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

<u>Architecture.</u>

Peter Westervelt, a master carpenter by trade, built the Gambrel roof section of the house in 1808 for Henry DeMott. Two years later Westervelt married DeMott's daughter Fransiney and moved into the house for which the frame addition was built. The house was eventually inherited by Peter Westervelt and his wife and thereafter was known as the Westervelt House.

The 1808 Western section is brownstone and has a typical early 19th century Dutch gambrel roof. The house is a good example of the blending of New Jersey Dutch techniques and the Federal Architectural style.

The 1810 frame addition is much plainer than the brownstone section. It appears to have built out of expediency rather than workmanship.

The main section of the Westervelt House has exquisite examples of the Adamesque Mantel. They are perhaps unparalleled in New Jersey in the carved details which they exhibit. One mantel, however, was recently altered by cutting a section out of the paneling. This section now rests over the doorway which leads into the Parlor.

Other noteworthy elements of the house are the ceiling cornices, the base boards, and the newel post, banister, and the risers of the stairway. On the sides of the risers are further Adamesque details.

Agriculture.

There are very few early 19th century farmhouse and barn complexes left in New Jersey, and especially in the now urbanized area of Hackensack and Englewood. The existence of the Peter Westervelt House and Barn is unusual and should be preserved to provide an indication of rural life in New Jersey in the 1800's.

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
