#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated on a spacious, shaded lot, the G.A. Mathews House in Brookings is a twoand-a-half story frame dwelling with a cross gable roof and a stone foundation. Hedges frame a semi-circular drive that begins at the lot line, follows along the east side of the house and leads to the garage at the rear of the lot. There is an abundance of trees and shrubs on the property - in keeping with the philosophy of the original owner who is credited with framing the ordinance that required tree planting in Brookings.


The house displays both Queen Anne and Classical Revival elements. In the Queen Anne tradition, a variety of textures are employed including the fish scaling of the upper level, the painted shingles of the middle level and the clapboard siding of the ground level. Modillions decorate the roofline fascia on all facades as well as the bell curve surface between the first and second stories. The water table also forms a flared surface. A pedimented protico, which is located off the south facade, is decorated with an elaborate scroll design. A porte cochere extends from the southeast corner of the house.

Fenestration includes a lunet on the south facade, a large oval window with a decorative surround on the west facade, a Palladian window on the east facade, double hung sash windows with delicate swags and pilaster surrounds on the south and west facade, and two sets of bay windows centered by rectangular leaded, stained glass windows, accompanied by sash windows with original surrounds on either side, on the east and west facade. Two sets of rectangular windows with original surrounds leads onto balconies on the south and east facade. An original upper spindle railing is retained only on the east facing balcony. Several other rectangular windows with original surrounds are irregularly spaced on all facades. Two rectangular windows are centered by mullions. Ground story bay windows are used on the east and west facade. All the windows let "in a flood of light and sunshine. In fact there is not a dark room in the house."(1) A protruding double hung window is next to the large brick chimney.

A semi-conical turret with a flared bottom is covered with shingles and is built into the gable section of the top story of the west facade. The metal finial atop the turret is original. A rectangular window with wooden rails is inset in a pediment dormer that is built into the turret.

An 1897 newspaper description includes the main floor plan: a tiled vestibule, reception hall and lavatory, a parlor (15'x15'), sitting room (15'x17'), dining room (13'x13'), pantry, china closet and kitchen.(2) The interior remains much the same today, but the use of some rooms has changed. The original lavatory has become a closet and the butler's pantry is now a bathroom. Original tile covers the floor of the vestibule. The original polished oak and polished cedar woodwork are unchanged. One of the most outstanding interior features is the fireplace: "a high red cedar mantel surmounted by a French plat glass mirror adorns this room and in the fireplace is set a base burning grate".(3) The kitchen interior contains structural alterations in the house--it has been modernized. The outside stairway was enclosed.

The most intriguing rooms	are found on the top floor and were call	ed the lumber and

the tank rooms in the 1897 newspaper account. This latter room, situated immediately beneath the roof, contains a tank with a capacity of twenty barrels and is connected both with the cistern and well. Water is elevated by means of force pumps and thus water is distributed to every floor. Hot water is provided in the same manner, the water passing down through pipes connected with a large heater in the kitchen."(4)

Some original pipe is enclosed in a plumbing chase. The unique gravity system for water and steam radiation heating was definitely a pioneer in the field.

A one-and-one-half story frame garage (contributing) with gable roof sets at the rear of the lot. The upper half story contains a loft and a clapboard loft door.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Built in 1896, the G.A. Mathews House in Brookings is architecturally significant as an intact example of late Queen Anne architecture with Classical Revival elements. It is also significant for its association with Attorney George A. Mathews, pioneer leader in local government and territorial politics.

The G.A. Mathews House relates to the South Dakota Historic Context IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement (1858-Present) D. Urban Development 2. Residences (1858-1899).

Situated on a spacious, tree-lined lot, the Mathews house displays both Queen Anne and Classical Revival elements. Its turret, porte-cochere, varied facade textures, and large porch are characteristic of the Queen Anne style while its Doric columns, Palladian window, swag and bow relief over the windows and some interior features such as the elaborate mantel piece - are more classically inspired. Other significant features include the original tile vestibule floor, interior stairs and wood trim, upper level window surrounds, and sculptured relief on the pediment of the front porch.

The G.A. Mathews Family acquired the property from the Fishbacks in 1892. Local news articles in 1896 and 1897 give a complete account of the construction of the Mathews residence. In 1896, J.C. Johnson moved the original Mathew's residence to Mondale Street between Brookings Street and Dakota Avenue.(1) Contractor A.D. Mower broke ground for the residence on July 1, 1896.(2) Steen and Wilson did the mason work. Grant Davis was in charge of electrical wiring,(3) while the plumbing was done by Hobart and Willis, Minneapolis. It was nearly completed by February, 1897 and Mathews had spent \$7,500 building the residence. According to the newspaper account, it had a very unique system of water, sewerage, heating and ventilation(4) The Mathews lived there until the 1920's. Several families, including the Fishbacks and Flitties(5) occupied it, possibly in a lease or rental arrangement until the property was purchased from the Mathews' heirs in 1942 by E.P. Johnson. A third generation Fishback family purchased the home in 1973.


"Mathews was a very prominent person, not only in the history and development of Brookings, but also in the story of the state."(6) A native of upper New York State, he graduated from Iowa State University law school in 1878.(7) Driving a team of mules hitched to a wagon, Mathews came from Iowa to Brookings in March, 1879. He settled in Fountain for a year and took up residence in Brookings in 1880, establishing one of the first law firms here with his partner J.O'B. Scobey. Mathews married Cora Thomas at West Union, Iowa in 1880. She passed away in 1889. He was later married to Bertha Van Dusen, sister of Mrs. Horace Fishback, Jr. Mathews was a member of the first Brookings Council and is credited with framing the ordinance that required tree planting in the city. In 1883, he was a member of the controversial Capital Commission which

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selected Bismarck to replace Yankton as the capital of Dakota Territory. He served as prosecuting attorney for the First Judicial Circuit and was a member of the Territorial Legislature. He held the distinction of being the last delegate to Congress from the Dakota Territory, having been elected in November of 1888. Mathews served as mayor of Brookings several times; he was elected in 1887, 1888 and 1897-1903. While serving as mayor in 1890, the city issued \$50,000 in bonds to start the municipal electric plant.

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
