Present and Original Physical Appearance:

This unusual bungaloid cottage is notable primarily for the three parallel gables of its roofline, a shape not found elsewhere in the Albuquerque inner city. The lowest and smallest gable sits over the entry porch, now windowed in; behind it a higher and wider gable, flush with the porch gable and main gable on the east side, offset on the west, covers an entry parlor. Behind this is the main gable over the body of the house. All the gable ends are supported by stepped brackets under a wide fascia board. Rafters are exposed in the wide eave overhangs.

The 1/1 wood sash windows are set under brick header lug sills, with concrete lintels. Windows in the enclosed front porch are aluminum sash. An exterior brick chimney on the west side sits in the L between the main and intermediate gables.

Significance of property:

This house is significant for its unusual architecture. A. W. Hayden, a contractor, was the first resident, and the probable builder of the house; by the mid-1920's W. D. Irwin, district manager for Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company lived here. The area has suffered from intrusions: the modern Albuquerque National Bank offices occupy what used to be St. Vincent School across Marble. But this house sits next to the very compatible Louis McRae House (New Mexico Cultural Properties Register, 7-26-74).
