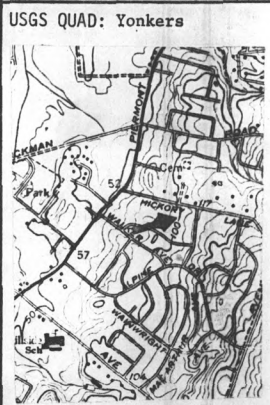

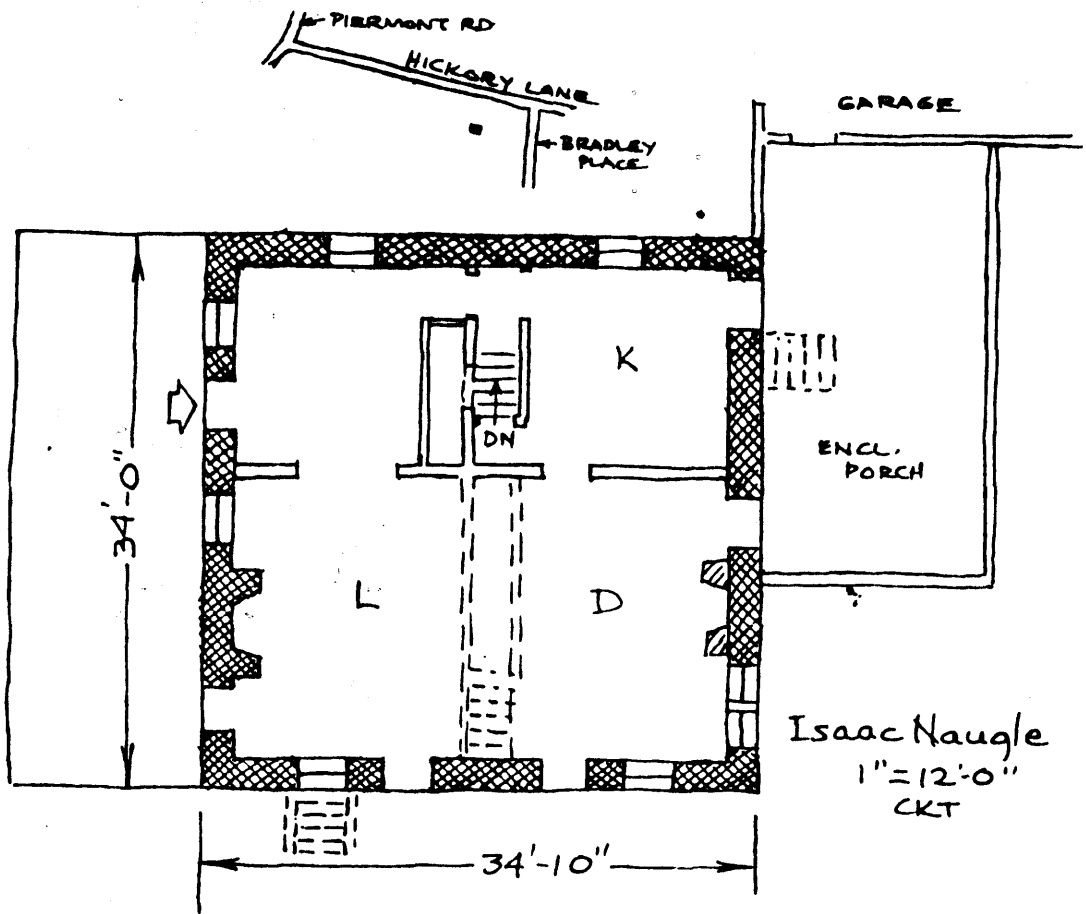

This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Rosalie Bailey says Hendrick Naugle owned this property and had house Piermont Road. In 1745 he married Catherine Blauvelt and had four daughters, and John, Isaac and Barent. Barent got the old homestead and Isaac received this land after he had already built the house. Mary Naugle in Bergen County Historical Society Papers and Proceedings #4 says that it was built by prior to 1780 by her great grandfather Isaac Naugle and that her grandfather Henry was born there in 1794 as well as her mother Eliza in 1826. Early in this century Louis T. Haggin (sic) of New York made it his summer house and repaired it without changing its ancient features. August Bentkamp of Alpine bought it in 1936 and leased it to Hugh McBain.
