DESCRIPTION:

The Henry Smith House is a one-and-a-half-story rectangular building of a type common in rural Idaho. The house is white, sheathed in thin clapboards. A one-story hip-roofed porch, supported on thin square posts with broader bases, shelters the front door, which is paneled, and has a large oval light. To the right of the door is a plate-glass window with an upper pane of diamond lights. Other windows are one-over-one double-hung sash with thinly molded heads. The roof, recently covered with asphalt shingles, has a brick chimney with a single outset course.

SIGNIFICANCE:

The Henry Smith House documents the later use of the classicizing American colonial revival style in the vernacular Challis house, a tendency that stretched from the 1890's through about 1920 and possibly later. Smith, a carpenter and school janitor, built his own home with a symmetrical gable facade, a temple-like front porch, and wide eaves. The preservation of this house is exemplary: down to the wooden porch floor, no alterations can be detected, except to the roof.
