Describe present and historic physical appearance.

St. Joseph's Chapel is a red brick Gothic Revival structure located in Sacred Heart Cemetery. The one-room building is characterized by a steeply pitched gable roof and a center entrance tower. The tower extends above the ridge of the main chapel roof to provide lancet arch openings on each elevation and terminates in a steeply pitched hip roof topped with a pressed metal cross.

Erected on a limestone block foundation, the common brick walls were laid with 7th course headers. A picture taken the day of the dedication of the chapel (attachment #1) indicates that originally the tower portion above the roof line was brick. This portion of the tower is now covered with 4" wood siding.

The original gable and tower roof was slate. The slate was removed during a 1982 improvement project and the roof was then shingled with asphalt shingles. A brick chimney on the east side of the roof remains in its original location and construction. The first chimney was capped with a brick arched opening (attachment #1). The chapel at one time was heated by a wood or coal burning stove.

A Gothic stone arch-shaped transom window with stained glass accents the doorway to the chapel centered in the entry tower on the south elevation of the chapel. The wooden paneled double doors shown in the 1981 Intensive Survey Form picture (attachment #2) have been replaced with double metal doors which contain small rectangular shaped clear glass windows. Directly above the main entry door and transom is a quatrafoil stained glass window also centerd in the tower face. On the north (rear) elevation of the building, a door leads to the crypt where at one time the bodies of three parish priests were entombed in a vault.

The symmetrical stained glass windows on the south elevation, flanking the tower, are accented by stone sills and stone lancet arched caps. The three lancet windows on each side wall of the chapel are identical to the windows on the south elevation. During the 1982 project the stained glass windows were restored and protected with Lexon covering. The tower louvered openings are contained within lancet arches.

Significant original interior features of the chapel have been preserved. In the original multi-covered floor tile, one tile located inside the front doorway is inscribed "Ross Bros. Eau Claire". During the 1982 restoration, the designs on the interior walls and ceiling were again hand painted and the gold leaf detail was restored. The altar and its intricately hand carved wooden relief reredos were also restored.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Erected in 1896, St. Joseph's Chapel is the only example of a late Nineteenth Century Gothic Chapel in the City of Eau Claire. This chapel is a fine local representation of Gothic Revival design highlighted by a steep gable roof, a central entrance two-story tower, and numerous lancet windows. St. Patrick's Church, 322 Fulton Street, is the other example of Gothic Revival Church architecture of the late Nineteenth Century in Eau Claire. Built in 1885, this National Register of Historic Places property (1982) is an impressive brick structure highlighted by one full tower and by numerous lancet windows.

The Catholic Church in Eau Claire was established in the mid-1850's. A frame church was erected on N. Barstow Street in 1858 and the parish was named St. Patrick's. In 1875 the parish was divided when a number of German-speaking members created Sacred Heart Church.

St. Joseph's Chapel was built in 1896 by Joseph Bemish, a member of Sacred Heart Parish. The cornerstone on the chapel, "St. Joseph's Kapelle 1896" attests to the year of construction and to the German ethnicity of this parish and its cemetery. The chapel is located on the east end of the five adjacent cemeteries. To the west lies the graves of St. Patrick's Parish, the graves of two Lutheran congregations, and lastly the graves of the Jewish community in the greater Eau Claire area. The Rev. John Metzler commissioned the building of the original structure in memory of the Rev. Joseph Boehm who died in 1893. Rev. Metzler succeeded Rev. Boehm as Sacred Heart's pastor.

Masses were held periodically in the chapel and three parish priests, Rev. Joseph Boehm, Rev. John Metzler and Rev. Paul Geyer were buried in the vaults of the chapel basement.

Parish records indicate that Mass was held at the chapel for the last times on Memorial Day and in the month of November in 1943. The Rev. John Peltz had the three bodies removed from the vaults and reburied in the cemetery.

In 1982 the congregation realized the chapel was deteriorating and soon would be at the point of demolition. The building had been used to store maintenance equipment for the cemetery. Alterations of the chapel were undertaken in the summer of 1982 under the leadership of Rev. Peter Eiden.

The interior painting and hand-painted art work on the ceiling was done by Haines Decorators of Arcadia, Wisconsin. The impressive wooden relief above the altar was refinished. Record of the original carver of the relief does not exist, but Dr. Kenneth Campbell, art history professor at the University of Wisconsin, Eau Claire, stated that most reliefs in the Upper Midwest during the late nineteenth century were done by carvers in Bavaria or by carvers from that same area who settled in Hugenot, Texas. Houser Studios of Winona, Minnesota, restored the stain glass windows.

St. Joseph's Chapel is a significant example of small scale Gothic design representing the building traditions of nineteenth century Eau Claire.

Criteria Consideration/Exceptions

The chapel is being nominated as an exception to the criteria as a religious structure deriving its primary significance from its architectural qualities.
