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Description

The Westcliffe Jail is a small, one-story, detached stone building located on the northwest edge of Westcliffe, a ranching community in the Wet Mountain Valley of south central Colorado. The jail at 116 Second Street faces east and is set back approximately 60 feet from the lot line.

Built in 1888 by Archie Scherer, a local stonemason, the jail has a nearly square plan measuring 17 feet by 18.2 feet. Constructed of roughly squared local fieldstone with concrete mortar, the building has a nearly flat roof with less than 2% pitch added in 1985. This was installed to protect the interior and the remnants of the original roof which was constructed of two by tens set side by side on edge and secured with square nails. These boards extended approximately three feet beyond the eaves creating a porch roof in front of the jail. Remnants of the boards are visible at the open gable ends. The modern common rafter roof is set on pine wall plates and covered corrugated tin. At the same time the mortar joints were repointed. The only entrance, a single door of rough-sawn vertical boards, is located on the south side of the east elevation. Two horizontal windows are located immediately below the eaves on the north and south elevations. These windows and the door have frames and lintels of rough-sawn wood. However, the horizontal window frames are neatly joined. The west window on the south elevation retains only the lower half of its frame and the bars have been removed. The remaining windows have four original locally made iron bars which are vertically set in the wooden frame.

The 360 square foot interior retains its original one-room plan which is divided into two cells, although the iron bar cell doors were removed in 1988. Interior walls are unfinished fieldstone and the floor is dirt. The building was constructed without plumbing facilities, although it was originally heated by a wood burning stove vented by an interior brick chimney with corbelled cap covered with concrete. It is located at the west end of the roof ridge.

The jail's setting remains that of a distinctly rural town with the grid pattern and town lots still evident. There is no landscaping and native grasses surround the building; however, a paved parking area is now located in the center of the lot between the jail and feed store.

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Statement of Significance

The Westcliffe Jail is historically significant under Criterion A for its association with the broad pattern of events involving the extension of government on the frontier by providing a mechanism for law enforcement. Constructed in c. 1888, the jail served as an incarceration facility until the mid-1920's when the local government had matured and was able to construct a courthouse and sheriff's department building with jail. The fieldstone building meets criterion C for its method of construction and the work of master stonemason, Archie Scherer. Scherer's skill in using the local fieldstone which he assembled in roughly squared courses yet embellished with quoins was recognized locally by residents and county officials who commissioned him to build houses, the jail and a school during the town's frontier period.

Historical Background and Significance

Westcliffe is located in the Wet Mountain Valley, west of Pueblo, Colorado, and is the Custer County seat. The area was settled initially in 1870 by a colony of some 300 German farmers from the Chicago area. Although the venture failed due to poor leadership and financial mismanagement, many of the settlers remained in the valley and their descendants settled in Westcliffe. Silver mining in the vicinity of Rosita and Silver Cliff brought several thousand prospectors into the region at the end of the same decade and soon attracted the interest of railroad builders.

Westcliffe was founded as a town when the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad brought its narrow gauge line up Grape Creek from Canon City. Although General William Jackson Palmer, the owner of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, saw a need for a line in the Silver Cliff area, he bypassed Silver Cliff in 1881 in favor of one of his own self-made company towns approximately one mile to the west. The town which became Westcliffe, was the product of Palmer and his partner Dr. William Bell, who had purchased ranch land where the new terminal was to be located. He platted the town and sold lots in anticipation of Palmer's railroad. The developers named the new town Clifton, which Bell later changed to Westcliffe after his birthplace, Westcliffe-on-the-Sea, a resort town in England. The town was incorporated in 1887 and became the main hub for the farming and ranching community.


The town had its quota of commercial buildings, hotels, restaurants and saloons. The jail was constructed in 1888, a year after incorporation for \$330 to counter the effects of the adjacent Dutch Row, a now vacant block once lined with saloons frequented by cowboys from the nearby ranches. It served mainly as a "drunk tank"

for those cowboys who over indulged until the mid-1920s when the town built a sheriff's department with a jail and county courthouse. During the same period, the county added another civilizing influence when it constructed a school in 1891.

The railroad ceased operations in 1938, but Westcliffe remains the trading and governmental center for the surrounding agricultural community. Since the midtwentieth century, modern highways and recreational opportunities offered by the beauty of the surrounding Sangre de Cristo mountains, have added tourism as an important component of the local economy.

The primitive jail is a typical example of the work of Archie Scherer, a skilled local stonemason, whose work ranged from residential to institutional and included Westcliffe's unique cottage style school, which was listed on the National Register in 1989. Scherer's ability to use local materials to express a building's function is evident in the massive quality of the stone walls. Yet, he revealed his attention to detail by surpassing the functional to incorporate quoins in this simple structure, as he did later in the school. Scherer artfully assembled one section of the jail's walls without mortar in order to provide a means of escape. He made use of that section himself when he was jailed soon after he completed construction. He spent the daytime hours of his ten-day sentence in the jail and his nights in his own home. 1

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Verbal boundary description

The boundary of the Westcliffe Jail is shown by the dashed line on the accompanying scale map. The boundary is 10 feet from the building on the north, east and west sides. On the south the boundary follows the alley line.

Verbal boundary justification

The boundary was drawn to include the jail and 10 feet of surrounding land historically associated with the property and to exclude the vast expanse of vacant property, the parking lot, the new commercial building and the Westcliffe Feed Mill.
